Point by point the fleet little wingman has been cutting away the lead of pace-setters Bill Cowley and Ray Gettiffe of Boston and Toronto's Moncton speedster Gordon Drillon. Official statistics tonight showed him with 24 points, seven behind Cowley, five behind Drillon and one back of Gettiffe.

### Maroons Run Wild To Take Senior Semi-final Series

MONTREAL, N. B., March 8—(CP)—Moncton Maroons smothered Charlottetown Abegweits 15-2 here tonight in the first of home and home, total-goal games in the Maritime senior hockey semi-finals, and will go into the second engagement at Charlottetown Wednesday night with a 13 goal lead.

The New Brunswick champions had a wide margin of the play and raced through a light Charlottetown defence almost at will. They scored two goals in the first period, seven in the second and six in the final frame, while Abegweits shot both their counters in the last session.

While outclassed, the Abegweits displayed courage in the face of the sprawling Maroons and Ray Stull proved a sturdy goalie. His work kept the score from being even, higher and when his defence collapsed before consistent attacks, he played like an over-worked jumping jack.

Clarence Bastarache opened the scoring early in the first period and George Appleby made it two for the Maroons before that session closed.

In the second, as the Maroons' dazzling plays began to click in earnest, the scorers were kept busy. Carroll and Len LeBlanc counted in brilliant team plays. Bell fired in another unassisted, Appleby followed with two as the result of passing bouts, and both Chapman and Babe LeBlanc scored on fast passing attacks to close the period.

In the third period, instead of showing signs of discouragement, the Abegweits played their best hockey of the night. McInnis, sturdy defenceman, fired in the first goal for the visitors 68 seconds after the start of the period.

After this was offset by George Bell Abegweits scored their second and final goal of the night when Bradley and Smith broke through the Moncton pack and skated in close to Barton before Bradley fired point blank into the upper corner of the net.
