ISLAND MEN APPROVE - The relief garden system as adopted by the Town of Amherst several years ago was approved by the Island men last week by H. K. Hemming and A. L. TRINITY UNITED CHURCH The Rev. Lewis M. Murray was the preacher at both services at Trinity United Church yesterday. At the morning service Mr. Murray took as the theme of his sermon, "The need for a vision of God." Great lives often draw their inspiration, power and endurance from one experience of God. This was true of Moses, of Paul, of Isaiah. When Uzziah died the people of Judah felt that their religious life, another their business life, and their vision of God all doubt and glory vanished for him for in God he found the only true security for all nations. The people's prosperity turned them away from God. They continued to make sacrifices but they were not sincere. Many people today divide their lives into compartments, one part they call their religious life, another their business life or secular life. True religion does not divide itself into parts, but controls and dominates every relationship of life. People have to be taught that the prime thing in religion is to see God, that is, to be sure of Him, to feel security in Him.
