ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS.—The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society will be held on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock in St. Paul's Parish Hall. The work of the Dispensary for the year will be reviewed and the matter of milk and meat inspection will also be taken up.

ISLANDER DEAD.—At Hyannis, Mass., on 11th March, William L. Power, aged 47 years, son of Mr and Mrs John Power, South Freetown, P.E.I., leaving a wife and three children. Mrs Power, wife of deceased, is a sister of Mr John R. Malone, Lower Freetown.—E.

FOX NOTE.—Many will be interested to learn that a litter of black foxes was born in the ranch of the Riverside Farming Co., Tryon, on Sunday, the 21st inst. The mother of this litter is not three years old until May, and yet this is her third litter. Her first litter, it is understood, was born when she was only ten months old.—V.

SCHOOLHOUSE BURNED.—The Bradabane schoolhouse, situated about half-a-mile south of the village, was consumed by fire early on Saturday morning last. It is not known how the fire originated, as the school was closed at noon on the day preceding. There was no insurance, and the loss will be felt by the district, which is not a large one, since the division of the district and opening of the village school some years ago.—E.

FORTY HOURS DEVOTION.—The Forty Hours Devotion commenced in Charlottetown yesterday, the Mass of Exposition being sung at 9 o'clock in Saint Dunstan's Cathedral. There is a large number of priests from the country parishes present and the attendance of worshippers is particularly large.

PROFITABLE TEA AND SALE.—The Ladies Sewing Circle of the Tryon Presbyterian Church held a concert and bazaar in the Tryon Hall on Wednesday evening, March 3rd. An excellent program was rendered under the management of Mr. Clayton Morrison. The fancy sale was in charge of Mrs. Frank Lang and Mrs. Robt. Simmons, and the home made candy was sold by other members of the Circle. The snug sum of \$55.00 being realized.

SPECIAL SERVICES.—The series of special services being held in Tryon by Rev. G. M. Young and Rev. A. H. H. began on Monday the 14th, and owing to the heavy snowfall during the past week the meetings were not well attended. The services will be continued this week, and the pastors are hoping for success. Rev. G. M. Young has already conducted special services in his churches at Victoria and Crapaud, and his work has been gratifyingly successful.—U.

THE STEAMERS.—The Minto made fairly good progress yesterday and at 6 o'clock she was six miles to the southward of Cape Bear in heavily packed ice. The Stanley made practically no headway all day and at latest reports was 2 miles Southeast of Cape Bear. There is very little prospect of either steamer docking unless a change of wind come. There was no special train to Georgetown last evening.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—Mr T. C. James addressed the closing session of the Teachers' Institute in the School Board Office last evening. Mr James has served as a member of the School Board for a number of years and has been associated with the educational life of Charlottetown for a quarter of a century. His address, which dealt with the improvement in education in the city, was therefore much enjoyed by the Institute, and while it eulogised the progress made along many lines, did not fail to point out where better things could be done. At the conclusion of the address the thanks of the Institute were tendered Mr James.

THE MAILS.—Eight boats left Cape Traverse yesterday morning at 9 o'clock with 45 bags of mail and after a very heavy crossing, reached Cape Tormentine at 3.45 p.m. A special train will be sent from Sackville to Tormentine this morning and it is expected that all the letter mail to date and the latest papers will be brought over by the eight boats to the Island to-day. The balance of the mail and mail will be sent around by Pictou. A special train left Charlottetown last evening at 8.45, the mail from which will be taken over by the eight boats which leave this side this morning. There was no foreign mail received on the island yesterday.

A PRESENTATION.—Mr John C. Stewart, formerly of Moore & McLeod's, a member of the Island Heavy Brigade, Garrison Artillery, leaving shortly for Halifax, was tendered a reception at his home Monday night on Fitzroy Street by the young people of Central Christian Church. About fifty were present. Mr Stewart was presented with a safety razor set and an emblematic Knights of Pythias ring. An appropriate address was delivered by Rev. W. J. Whitehead. An enjoyable musical programme was rendered, games were played, and refreshments were served during the evening. Mr Stewart repited in fitting terms. He expressed his appreciation of the kindness and good wishes of the friends who had honoured him on the occasion and thanked them heartily for their most acceptable gift.

ROLL OF HONOUR.—From Grace Church, two members have gone forth to serve their country in the present war. These are Grove Carter, son of Benjamin Carter, and Bruce Wonnacott, son of Mr John Wonnacott. In commemoration of their meritorious act in volunteering, Grace Church has prepared a roll of honour inscribed with the names of these two young men. This roll, done in several colours, is the pen work of Mr L. W. Watson of Charlottetown. It bears the following inscription:—"Roll of Honour, 1914. To the honour of Grove Carter and Bruce Wonnacott, faithful members of Grace Church, who nobly volunteered to serve their King and country in the great world war, and left the city to join the second Canadian contingent on December 4, 1914. For God, for King, and Country." The photographs of the two young men are placed on either side of the roll. On the top are Union Jacks surmounted by a crown, flanked with monograms of the young volunteers. The border is very artistic. The words "Roll of Honour" are set in a scroll of gold and red. Mr Watson is deserving of credit for his splendid piece of work. The roll will be suitably framed and will be placed in the church next Sunday.


