Canada's Agricultural Outlook Bright

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Nov. 21—Canada is beginning five or 10 years of the greatest progress its agricultural industry has ever seen, declared Hon. Duncan Marshall, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, speaking tonight to representative farmers and stock raisers from every province, together with prominent guests from the United States and overseas, at the annual dinner of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

"One third of the wealth of Canada is in the hands of the agricultural interests of the country," said Mr. Marshall. "The men and women behind this great industry have had their hard times; they have been through the lean years of depression. But a new day is dawning for the farmer. Canada is coming into its own as one of the greatest agricultural nations of the world."

Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, said it was being recognized the agricultural industry was the most important in the world; all others depended for their progress on its success. He asked that every part of Canada, west, central and east, reach out in co-operation to make Canada the most progressive agricultural nation in the world.

Mr. Taylor pointed to the training of 30,000 young men and women of the boys' and girls' club teams in the fundamentals of the industry as one of Canada's greatest prospects.

Speaking on behalf of Western Canada, Hon. D. C. McKenzie, Manitoba Minister of Agriculture, pointed to the West's exhibits as an evidence of its determination to rise above all difficulties. He said the western provinces proposed to shape their agricultural production to meet the demands of the world's markets.

One of the features of the evening was the presentation of cups by Dr. G. S. Barton, Dominion Deputy Minister of Agriculture, to the winners of stock, poultry and seedling judging contests, among the 64 contestants of the boys' and girls' clubs from various provinces.

WINTER PROTECTION FOR ROSES

(Experimental Farms Note)

The successful wintering of roses in Eastern Canada constitutes a difficult problem. In fact, winter losses are frequently so great as to discourage many amateur growers, who otherwise would be enthusiastic rose growers.

Experiments conducted over a period of years at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, New Brunswick, have indicated that these losses can be reduced to a minimum if certain precautionary measures are taken. It must be borne in mind that the successful wintering of roses is dependent upon the interaction of a number of factors, all of which are important.

In the first place, it is necessary to have a vigorous, well-grown bush with the wood well ripened before the onset of winter. This implies the planting of the bush in a favourable location followed by proper fertilization and cultivation practice. This practice should be such as to promote a vigorous growth in the early summer followed by a slackening of growth in mid-summer and a thorough ripening of wood in the fall. Nitrogenous fertilizers should not be applied after the first week in August and artificial watering should also be gradually reduced to a minimum. Heavy fertilization in the early

summer is advisable in order to promote a vigorous growth. Small bushes, which have made a very weak growth during the summer, are much more susceptible to winter injury than large vigorous bushes, providing the wood is well ripened.

After the bushes are properly grown, it is then necessary to give them suitable winter protection. This can best be done by hilling up each individual bush to a height of at least eight inches with soil. This should be removed very early in the spring, in order to hasten the thawing of the soil underneath. The bushes should then be uncovered as soon as the soil is fit to move.
