COMING TO CANADA.—Corporal Peter A. Hughes has received cables from England stating that on the Baltic, which sailed on January 29th there were 66 officers, 7 cadets and 2095 other ranks. The Tunisian had 24 officers and 123 other ranks. On board the latter were 2 officers and 8 cadets for the Nova Scotia and P. E. Island Military District.

The steamer will be placed on regular passenger and freight service between Halifax and those points. Sailings will commence about March 1st. Capt. Schmeisser, formerly of the steamer Scotia will command the Enterprise. Joseph Wood and Company will be the Halifax agents.

F. in the Maritime Provinces died at his home in Moncton this week after an illness extending over some months. Deceased was a native of Queen's County, N. ROLLIE NORMAN HERE.—His many friends in Charlottetown are pleased to see in the city again Mr. Roland Norman, Moncton, formerly of hockey fame, now a Flight Lieutenant of the Royal Air Force. He enlisted in the Royal Flying Corps in November, 1916 receiving his commission in December of the same year. He was attached to flying squadrons and has been flying at the front until the armistice was signed. While on patrol duty he met with a severe accident and was several months in the hospitals. In October, 1918, he was ordered to Canada on duty, and the signing of the armistice extended his leave, and he is now awaiting further instructions.

TEEN AGE TRAINING FOR GIRLS.—A meeting of those interested in the training of teen age girls was held in the Baptist Schoolroom yesterday afternoon. There was a goodly attendance. Mrs. J. A. Clark presided and introduced Miss Thomas who gave a very clear explanation of the co-operation of the larger Protestant denominations, the Sunday School Associations and the Y. W. C. A. in Canada for the purpose of training teen age girls. She pointed out that this work is being enthusiastically carried on by all the units above named.
