



Hi-Y Wins City Basketball Title

Navy Team Lose Second Game By 39-29 Count — Round Score Is 74 To 63.

Hi-Y Club hoopers won their second City Basketball title in three years at the "Y" gym Saturday night when they turned back the Navy team 39-29 in the second game of their two-game total point series. The round score was 74-63, Hi-Y having won the first game 35 to 24. As was expected it was a fast, rugged tilt all the way through that had one of the largest crowds in recent years in a high state of excitement.

Hi-Y started away at a fast clip and after Navy had scored the opening basket three minutes after the start the Club team took command of the play to run up a 21 to 7 lead twelve minutes after the start.

Navy took time out and after play was resumed they cut into the big lead by their long range shots started to hit the basket. For the last eight minutes they outscored the winners ten points to seven, the period ending 28 to 17.

It was brilliant work by Jack McLean in this season that was responsible for the Hi-Y lead. The tall left forward sank seven baskets and a foul shot for 15 points of his team's total.

It was the losers' turn to force matters as the second and final half got underway. They thwarted all scoring attempts of the new champions for over half the period, holding them to a penalty shot, running the score to 29-23 and it looked as if they were going to pull up on even terms. But after they had taken a time out Hi-Y resumed their scoring ways, and McLean accounted for five baskets before the period ended with the Navy crew sinking three.

The losers suffered a severe loss in the last five minutes as "Red" McLean was banished for four personal, this player having kept the ever dangerous McLean without a point during his stay in the second period. Navy had outscored the Hi-Y 12-11 during the season.

While the whole Hi-Y team worked like a well-oiled machine, Jack McLean and Storey were especially brilliant, the latter player's work on the defence being of a high calibre.

Cox was easily the pick of the Navy team Saturday night, following closely for honors by McLean and L. Connolly.

PEDEN AND AUDY WIN BIKE GRIND

Twelve Thousand See Colorful Pair Win First Place in Mt'l Six-day Race

(G.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 22.—Torchy Peden, flaming haired giant from British Columbia, today was sailing away his winner's share of a six-day bicycle race for the 23rd time since he turned professional back in 1920.

Peden, aided by a game display by the little blonde, Jules Audy of Montreal, captured first honor in Montreal's 10th international six-day race which ended here just before midnight Saturday. It was the sixth time on various tracks of the continent that the big and little combination had swept home victorious.

Keen Battle

Twelve thousand who filled every vantage point in the Forum watched a keen battle during the last hour of continuous sprints between the winners and Alfred Letourner and Heri LePage, the reconstructed "red devil" team, who placed second. Letourner and LePage held a wide margin in sprint points and only need to draw level in distance to win the race.

But every time either of the "red devils" picked an angle of the track in the hope of shaking off the opposition, Peden or Audy was right on their heels. Repeatedly the red team tried to break loose. But it could not be done.

Finished Level

Three other teams finished level with Letourner and LePage tied in second place in distance but well behind in sprint points. They were "Iron men" Regie McNamara, the New York veteran of 49 years of age and Fred Zach, Swiss rider now living here; Onetime Boucheron and Andre Mouton, Frenchmen making their first Canadian appearance; and the game young all-Canadian team of Regie O'Flaherty, Toronto, and Roy MacDonald, Ottawa.

Kas. Relay Records Are Smashed

By Guardian's Special Wire) LAWRENCE, Kas., April 22.—The name of Indiana stood beside two of the five new Kansas relay records today—and likely will stay there for a long time—and Glenn Cunningham's was opposite the carnival record for the mile, an event not ordinarily held in this first major test of the midwestern outdoor season.

The Hoosier mile and two-mile relay teams, anchored respectively by Ivan Fuqua and Charley Hornbostel, set impressive new lows for their distances. The mile relay team beat its own 1932 relay mark, running the four quarters in 3:18.4, with Fuqua retaining over Cunningham, the 10-year advantage given him on the last lap by Hornbostel. Indiana's new two-mile record of 7:46 beat the old mark by 6.5 seconds, held jointly by Chicago and Iowa State.

Because the weather was too cool for his best, Cunningham made no effort to beat the world mark in the special mile race. He was content to conquer Gene Venzke of Pennsylvania by 20 yards in 4:12.7.

Yankees And Senators Win Sunday Games After Losing On Saturday

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 22.—Vernon "Lefty" Gomez, the strike-out king, was in mid-season form at Boston today when New York Yankees slaughtered three Boston Red Sox pitchers for an 8-1 victory before an overflow crowd of 44,631 cash customers. More than 6,000 others were refused admittance to the enlarged Fenway Park.

"Dusty" Rhodes opened for the Red Sox and the Yanks nipped him for single runs in the first and fourth innings before he collapsed in the fifth, when the visitors scored three runs on one hit, a homer over the 40-foot left field way by Chapman with one on. Combs and Crockett were passed and long flies by Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig accounted for the other run. Three consecutive doubles in the ninth, by Ruth, Gehrig and Chapman, gave the Yanks their final pair of runs.

Washington Senators nosed out the Athletics 4-3 by pushing across a run in the ninth inning at Philadelphia. Home runs by Fred Schulte, Washington centre-fielder, and Frank Hayes, A's catcher, and the close to airtight pitching of Al Thomas for the Senators and Roy Mahaffey for the Athletics kept the Sunday crowd of more than 20,000 on edge.

Schulte accounted for the first three Senatorial runs by his homer in the seventh. Hayes, rookie on the A's staff, tied the score at 3-3 in the eighth by hitting his homer with Higgins on base. In the ninth, Manush singled off Mahaffey's glove, went to third on Cronin's single to centre, and scored the winning run on West in the ninth. Inning game Rogers Hornsby's St. Louis Browns a 6-5 victory over Chicago White Sox at Chicago in a game witnessed by 14,000 fans.

New York Yankees figured one of the strongest pennant contenders, took another beating at Boston when the Yankee sluggers were unable to match blows with the Red Sox batsmen. Babe Ruth hammered out two home runs but the Red Sox jumped on the Gotham twirlers to finally win out 9-6 before 25,000 persons.

In Philadelphia, the champion Washington Senators took another pasting as "Sugar" Cain outlasted any Senator moundman and the Athletics won 7-2.

Va., April 22.—For the second time in as many years, Frank Shields, lanky Davis Cup player from New York won the Plaza Challenge Bowl, emblematic of the singles championship of the Mason and Dixon tennis tournament today, defeating Hilo Bryan M. Grant Jr., 1-6, 6-3, 8-6, 6-4.

Grant, who had sprung one spectacular upset by accomplishing the elimination of Lester Stofen, tall Los Angeles blond, in the semi-finals, almost put over another one today but weakened badly after he seemed to have the match safely in hand.

The tiny southerner outplayed Shields by a wide margin in both of the first two sets but began to tire in the third. Except for a brief interval in the fourth set when Grant led 2-0, Shields was in control thereafter.

Trailing 6-1 at the end of the fourth inning, they staged a comeback while young Johnny Salveson and Joe Bowman halted the Boston attack and fell just one run short of a tie after Homer Peel clouted a pinch home run in the ninth with Paul Richards on base.

That blow finished Dutch Brandt, who had hurled a good game, and Fred Frankhouse stepped in to retire the last two batsmen, fanning pinch batsman Frank O'Doul for the final out.

A four-run rally in the eighth enabled the Dodgers at home to beat the Phillies by 7-5 and to avenge a three-game series. Thirty-two players, including nine pitchers found their way into the wild action.

Five New Swim Marks Are Set

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. LOUIS, April 22.—Five new meet records have been established as outstanding swimmers of Canada and United States journeyed home tonight after competing in the International Y. M. C. A. 12th annual swimfest.

Bob Pirie of Toronto conclusively proved his right as the king of the middle distance swimmers by winning the 440-yard free style in 5:03.3 for a new record. The former time, also set by Pirie was 5:06.6.

Leonard Spence, member of the famous Spence clan formerly of Montreal, finished behind the Canadian with Harold Weatherbee of San Francisco third and Gerald Ridg, Huntington, fourth.

After a tough battle with the San Francisco team, the Orange, N. J., swimmers successfully defended their "Y" title for the third straight year, running up a total of 37 points.

Running even in the point score with Orange, the San Francisco team lost the meet in the last two events. The leaders were tied at 64—all when Walter Spence won the 220-yard free style in 2:14.5, two seconds faster than the old meet record, to give the easterners a two-point advantage. The Orange team then won the 300-yard medley relay to clinch the title.
