MORE CASUALTIES.—The latest casualty list contains the following additional names: Infantry, wounded—W. Goodwin, Morell Station; P. J. Francis, Lennox Island; W. S. Hughes, Charlottetown; F. McDonald, Cable Head.

ADOPTERS OF WAR PRISONERS are only asked to continue their present contributions. There has been some delay at the Toronto Headquarters in sending the names of the prisoners, but the Treasurer hopes to receive them this week.

SUCCESSFUL SERVICE.—A very large audience attended the special Sunday School Song Service at Vernon River last Sunday, the church being crowded to standing room. The singing and recitations were splendidly given and the whole service most interesting and much enjoyed.

THE HALIFAX EXPLOSION.—The number of amputations made necessary as the result of injuries received in the explosion at Halifax, on Dec. 6th last, as shown by the most recent records of the Relief Commission, were 29. Of these 13 were men; 7 were women; 8 were children. One lad of 12 lost his left leg at the thigh, a little girl of 7 lost one eye and one finger; one of only 9 years lost his left arm; one of 7 his left foot; one girl of 16 lost her left leg; a boy of 15 his right arm. In 19 cases both eyes had to be removed, of these 7 were children, the ages being 9, 7, 6, 5, and 2½ years. 264 persons lost one eye, of whom 48 were under 15 years of age.

YESTERDAY'S MEETING.—A meeting of the executive of the P. E. Island Dairy Association was held in the office of the Commissioner of Agriculture yesterday at 1:30 p.m., Vice-President J. H. Simpson in the chair. Directors present were: J. A. Dewar, M.L.A., David McDonald, D.J. Thompson, James O'Connor and Wm. Underhay. Secretary-Treasurer J. F. Profit, Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, Com. of Agriculture and Inspector Morrow were present by invitation. Considerable routine business was transacted tending to stimulate and encourage the Dairy Industry in general. The matter of grading milk at cheese factories whereby the patron would be paid according to the quality of milk delivered, received much favor. At the close of the meeting the Commissioner of Agriculture was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for his attendance.
