GUARDIAN COMMENT

The Guardian editorial which occasioned the above statement by Mr. Coldwell read as follows: "It is to be hoped that Mr. Coldwell, when he speaks in Summerside tonight, will explain the incident occurring in British Columbia a few weeks ago, when the C.C.F. provincial convention repudiated the advice of the C.C.F. National Council and refused to pass a resolution endorsing the Atlantic Pact. A similar incident occurred last summer when the Maritime C.C.F. convention went on record against the Marshall Plan, which is the economic counterpart of the Atlantic Pact. Early in the recent session at Ottawa the C.C.F. mustered only a handful of its members in support of the Atlantic Pact. It did somewhat better in a later vote, but the absence of many of its members on the first test was significant.

OPENING REMARKS

North Rustico Tells Problems To Prime Minister

"If the alleged facts are correct, I understand your harbour is in need of attention. Although this is before an election, I am not making promises. But I am getting first-hand information on local problems and will know of them when I meet them again," declared Prime Minister St. Laurent at North Rustico yesterday at a meeting in the Stella Maris Hall.

Mr. St. Laurent was replying to a brief presented by Father Eric Robin on behalf of the people of the fishing community. The brief called for government action to assist the canning industry. It pointed out that the \$7,000 received last year will now be denied the 116 fishing families this year and that there will be no work after the lobster season ends.

The second point in the brief was a request to complete public works on the harbour. "I am deriving valuable knowledge about the canning industry and the situation there has got to be modified," the Prime Minister continued. "The Department of Fisheries is making provisions for the industry to stand on its own feet."

"There is room for substantial improvement in our handling of fish and Canada should consume much more of your product," Mr. St. Laurent concluded with a brief speech in French and shook hands with the members of the audience.

Mr. Earl Simpson, Cavendish, convener of the Liberal pool, presided. On arriving at North Rustico, the Prime Minister planted a tree in the yard in front of the Hall. Over 100 guests enjoyed a lobster lunch, served by the ladies and Girl Guides of the district.

Before leaving the village, Mr. St. Laurent posed for photographers, as he autographed a smiling teenager's album. Before leaving Charlottetown, the Prime Minister called on Lt. Governor J. A. Bernard and signed the guest book. Thence to the City Hall where he met Mayor B. Earle MacDonald and the city councillors.

The party then visited the Confederation Chamber in the company of Premier J. Walter Jones and signed the guest register. From there they visited the House of Assembly. Mrs. St. Laurent, flanked by the Prime Minister and the Premier, posed in the Speaker's chair, for photographers.

On the way to Summerside, the Prime Minister's party visited "Green Gables" in the National Park. West Point Ferry "Mr. MacNaught," he said, "has been insisting that another ferry should be provided to give to the people of the upper part of Prince County the service provided by the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry by the people of the other end of the Island. It may be that he is right. The ferry service at Wood Islands certainly performs a valuable service. The proposed new service has to be carefully investigated and reported on as to its repercussions to the Canadian economy. It can and should be provided if it can be demonstrated that it can be done to the benefit of the Canadian economy."

"I am sure that Mr. MacNaught and his friends will go before the royal commission of transportation to show that it is necessary and practical." Mr. St. Laurent quoted at length from a speech given recently by Donald Gordon, deputy governor of the Bank of Canada which showed that with a population increase of 16 percent the production of fish is up by 76 percent. He quoted other figures to show that the increased production of most products that savings have also increased. "I suggest to you," he said, "that my colleagues and I happened to be there while this was taking place. We feel that, in the interests of the Canadian people it might not be unwise to retain us another four or five years."

Mr. St. Laurent said that everywhere in Canada satisfaction has been expressed that the dream of the fathers of confederation has come true and he suggested that the new province should prove a good market for the surplus agricultural products of Prince Edward Island. He dwelt briefly with the North Atlantic Pact, which he described as an agreement to stand together by people who have the same Christian traditions and the desire to avoid another war.

Mr. St. Laurent said "there has been an extraordinary increase in the general prosperity of Canada since 1945. Of course there may be some individuals who have not felt it but they must be rather few and I think that the people of Prince Edward Island feel that they have shared in the general increase of prosperity. Trade Policies "We have had trade policies that have favoured the creation of prosperity. The resourcefulness of the merchant of the government has prevented serious dislocations in our economy."

He gave much credit for this favourable condition of trade to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, the Hon. C.D. Howe and said, "He will know where to go to find any market that any man can find to market Canadian products." The Prime Minister described this Province as the greatest producer of seed potatoes on the North American continent and said that it is due to "the industry of the people but also to the methods of production discovered in the experimental stations of the Federal Department of Agriculture."

He said that the quantity and quality of oysters harvested here is due to "the application by the fishermen of the discoveries made in the biological stations of the Department of Fisheries." Dealing with social security measures put into force by the late Government he said that the unemployment insurance fund contains now over 500 million dollars.

He referred to old age pensions and said that his Government had recently raised the monthly amounts by ten dollars. He also dealt with the Family Allowance Act and said that over seven thousand dollars every month through the application of this act.

He also dealt with the health services now being made available through Dominion Government grants. In the matter of transportation he said that the new car ferry is a concrete example of what has been done in this field.

Premier Jones Draws Laughs

(Canadian Press) Premier Jones of Prince Edward Island drew loud laughs last night when he said the Island's tax agreement with Ottawa allowed its government to improve roads and increase teachers salaries 80 per cent.

But he invited contradiction and got none from an audience which packed a local theatre to hear Prime Minister St. Laurent. Mr. Jones said the agreement increased the Province's revenue from transferred tax sources and from Federal grants from \$1,100,000 to \$2,185,000 and the sum would probably reach \$2,800,000 this year. "We have been able to build better and more permanent roads," he said. This brought fairly general chuckles. He repeated the statement and laughs came again.

He said teachers' salaries had gone up 80 per cent and there were more chuckles. He said then that the teachers got more than their Federation asked and invited contradiction to either statement. The agreement, he said, raised P.E.I.'s standard of services from 65 to 85 percent of the national scale and he hoped to attain 100 percent when a new contract was negotiated.

He said he has invited Mr. St. Laurent to spend two weeks in the Governor General's cottage in the National Park here "after he wins the election."
