In the second competition for the best collection \$1.00, second best collection .75, third best collection .50. The conditions are that the competitor shall bring with the exhibit the envelope the seeds were in when purchased, and that no green or anything else be used except what is furnished by the Sweet Pea. No doubt quite a number will enter the competition.
