ISLAND WELCOMES GOOD ROADS DELEGATES

Send Families Across Frontier Government Defenders Of Iron, Hard-pressed, Threaten To Expose Rebel Prisoners As Targets For Bombs.

IRON, Spain, Aug. 31—The sorely-pressed government defenders of Iron tonight sent their own loved ones across the French frontier and swore they would expose 300 rebel prisoners as hapless targets for rebel bombs.
The prisoners were trucked into the battered and besieged city from nearby Fort Guadalupe.
Fierce and colorful units of Asturian miners fighting in the service of the government spent the lull between bombardments by fashioning their crude home-made bombs.
Chunks of dynamite they wrapped in paper so that the grenade shaped up like a piece of soap. Bottles they filled with gasoline and fuses. They have hurled these bombs with deadly accuracy.

HOUE PEEVED AT VICTORY OF DUPLESSIS

MONTREAL, Aug. 31—Jovial Camille Houde, Montreal's three-term mayor and once leader of the Conservative party in Quebec, is looking for a job.
He told the people of Montreal today he had resigned from the Mayoralty office last Thursday because he could not agree with the policies of Premier Maurice Duplessis from whose regime he predicted would come secession of Quebec from Confederation, and the death of the Conservative party in this French-Canadian Province.
"Serious consequences for the French-Canadians in the near future," also were predicted by Mr. Houde who said there has been growing in Quebec "a spirit of intense nationalism."
Verdict of the people in the last provincial election when Conservative leader Duplessis was elected at the head of a Union Nationale Government with 76 of the 90 Legislative seats, "makes plain" the trend in this direction, said the former Mayor in a lengthy statement.
Thus, with election of the party headed by Mr. Duplessis, who promised to abolish Montreal's sales tax, instituted by Mr. Houde, the Mayor considered his mandate had expired.

Strikers And Police Clash

CORNWALL, Ont., Aug. 31—The strike situation in the giant rayon mill of Cornwall (Canada) remained unsettled tonight as negotiations to bring the 20-day-old dispute to a halt struck a snag.
After a conference today between Henry Johnson, mill president, and a committee of workers which lasted only 10 minutes, Arthur Laverty, president of the striking union said the company broke off negotiations and that workers would continue picketing the plant.
Meanwhile a clash between striking workers and provincial police took place when about 250 pickets attempted to prevent a street railway power car from being brought into the plant grounds. One picket tried to pull the motorman from the power car but police came to the motorman's aid. The remaining pickets, according to police, swarmed around them in an attempt to take away the man who, police say, tried to intimidate the motorman.
As a result eight men were arrested, one charged with intimidation and the others with obstructing police. A police constable suffered a split lip in the clash.
Frank Love, union organizer, was given suspended sentence today when he appeared on charges of intimidation arising out of the disturbances two weeks ago. (Continued on Page 7)

Three Killed In Plane Crash

EAST MEADOW, N. Y., Aug. 31—(AP)—Three occupants of a private airplane were killed when the plane failed to come out of a tailspin and dove into a large field near this Long Island village today.
Lieut. Jack Bishop, Canadian Maritime pilot with the Royal Air Force, was believed to have lost control of the machine while watching a barn burning near the field.
Bishop and his companions, Roy Anderson, 31, a student pilot, and Raymond George William Carlson, 19, were killed instantly as the plane crashed upside down.
The three men had taken off from Roosevelt Field 10 minutes before they crashed to investigate the barn fire.
Bishop was a business partner of Annette Gibson, aviatrix, operating a private air service at Roosevelt Field.
An honorary member of the Nassau County police force, he did aerial patrol duty for them when called on.

REBELS MARCH ON TOLEDO

Capture Four Towns And Rout Large Enemy Force.

BURGOS, Spain, Aug. 31.—Gen. Francisco Franco's Moroccan veterans pushed their forced march on Toledo, an important stage forward, when they routed a large enemy force at Baldevero and subsequently captured four towns, it was announced at rebel headquarters here tonight.
Flight of the Loyalists resulted in the taking of Oropesa, Arranda, Torralba and Puente Del Arzobispo. Meanwhile the rebels launched new offensive movements in the north by land, sea and air. Successful engagements were claimed in the mountains northwest of Madrid and in the region directly west of Madrid and on the northern coast. (Copyright 1936 by the Havas News Agency)

MARITIMETRADE BD. MEETING IN CH'TOWN

Finance Minister Dunning and Commerce Chamber President Matthews Among Special Speakers.

HALIFAX, Aug. 31—Hon. C. A. Dunning, Canadian Finance Minister, will address the annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade in Charlottetown Sept. 23, according to a tentative program released today by Secretary E. A. Saunders.
Other special speakers at the annual meeting Sept. 23 and 24 will include Hon. R. C. Matthews, President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and A. O. Dawson, Past President of the Canadian Chamber.
Addresses of welcome will be made at the opening of the convention by Lieut.-Governor George DeBlois of Prince Edward Island, Mayor Percy Turner of Charlottetown and President J. J. Morris of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.
Reports of President Dr. J. A. Clark, of Charlottetown, the secretary and Rand H. Matheson, manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission, will then be made. Mr. Dunning and Mr. Dawson will speak at a luncheon that day.
At the afternoon session, delegates will hear reports of J. D. McKenna, chairman of the Transportation Commission, and president of the Saint John board, and F. MacLure, secretary of Saint John, secretary-treasurer of the Transportation Commission before resolutions of the various boards of trade represented submitted to the policy committee. George E. Graham, vice president and general manager of Dominion Atlantic Railways will address the session.
Hon. Mr. Matthews, is to speak at the annual banquet Wednesday night.
On Thursday the convention will hear addresses from A. B. Wiswell, president of the Halifax Board of Trade and S. W. Fairweather, director of economics, Canadian National Railways, and reports of the policy committee. Officers for the ensuing year will be elected before the close of the convention.

Adopted Son Of Secy. Ickes Found Shot To Death

CHICAGO, Aug. 31—Tragedy struck on the last day of August for the second successive year into the family circle of Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes, its victim today being Wilmarth Ickes, 37, son of the Cabinet member.
The young man, an official of a printing company, married and the father of three children, was found shot to death by the caretaker at the parental home in suburban Winnetka, a .38 automatic pistol lying on his chest.
Just one year ago today, his mother, Mrs. Anna Wilmarth Ickes, wife of the Secretary, was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Velarde, N.M. The son of Mrs. Ickes by a former marriage, Wilmarth had been legally adopted by Ickes. He had been in ill-health. Police called the death suicide.

Was Native Of Charlottetown

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 31—(CP)—George S. Thorne, 67-year-old native of Charlottetown, died here Sunday. He was foreman of the North Sydney Herald publishing company in 1934 and in 1908 became the editor. He resigned in 1923 to enter other work in the newspaper field.

Convention Opens Today With Representatives From All Parts Of The Continent

Upwards Of 250 Delegates From Canada And United States Will Be In Attendance. Conference Promises To Be One Of Most Important Held In Association's History.

Delegates, more than 200 in number, from seven of the nine Canadian Provinces and from several states in the American Union were gathered in Charlottetown last night for the 22nd annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association which opens here today.
Highway Department officials and engineers, motor vehicle officers and automobile associations officials will attend the three-day convention.
The general theme of the deliberations will be improvement of Canada's highways. Among the speakers will be highway engineers, and Canadian and United States contractors and manufacturers of road materials and road building machinery.
The purpose of the Canadian Good Roads Association is to "collect and distribute information concerning highway legislation, construction and maintenance, in the various cities, towns, villages, and municipalities throughout Canada; to stimulate and encourage in all ways the improvement, construction and maintenance of roads; the whole from an educational and practical standpoint."
President of the Association, Hon. G. Shelton Sharp of Tyne Valley, Prince Edward Island will call the first session of the convention together this morning at 9:30.
The delegates will be welcomed to the province by Lieutenant Governor DeBlois, Premier Thane A. Campbell and Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works. Mayor P. W. Turner will extend a welcome on behalf of Charlottetown's citizens.

The first business session of the convention is scheduled to begin at 10:30 a. m. and will be presided over by Hon. J. P. McIntyre.
Delegates officially representing the provinces are: Arthur Dixon, Deputy Minister of Public Works, British Columbia; Hon. Charles M. Dunn, Minister of Highways, Saskatchewan; Hon. T. B. McQuesten, Minister of Highways, Ontario; Hon. A. Parris, Chief Engineer, Quebec; Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier and Minister of Public Works, New Brunswick; Hon. A. S. McMillan, Minister of Highways, Nova Scotia, and Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works, Prince Edward Island.
The present convention will be the Association's second in this province. The sixteenth annual meeting was held in Charlottetown in 1920. All attendance records for conventions held outside the provinces of Ontario and Quebec are expected to be broken, Association officials predicted last night.
Highlights of the sessions will be addresses by C. A. Hogenotier, senior highway engineer of the United States bureau of public roads; Hon. W. Griffin, engineer of Surveys and plans for New Jersey; C. A. Robbins, resident engineer, Ontario department of Highways; P. L. Pratley, Montreal; William E. Barker, Chicago; C. B. Crossdale, Chief highway engineer for New Brunswick; Arthur Dixon, deputy minister of public works for British Columbia; A. Bergeron, assistant deputy minister of highways for Quebec; and Hon. T. B. McQuesten, minister of highways in Ontario.

France And Poland Strengthen Ties

PARIS, Aug. 31—(CP-Havas)—Tightening of military and economic ties between Germany's eastern and western neighbors—France and Poland—was hoped for here tonight as a result of conferences in progress between Inspector-General Rydz-Smigly, "strong man" of Poland and French leaders.
During the day the Polish General had talks with Premier Blum, Foreign Minister Delbos, War Minister Daladier, General Gustave Gamelin, French chief of staff, and other prominent officials.

Opposes Measures To Strengthen League

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 31—(CP-Havas)—The Swedish government tonight informed the League of Nations secretariat it opposed further measures to strengthen the League covenant "since some of its existing provisions were not being observed."
The government's communication was in reply to a circular letter sent out by the League regarding proposals advanced by Great Britain, France, and other countries for revision of the covenant.

Trotzky To Have Special Guard

OSLO, Norway Aug. 31—Norway appeared tonight to have found a compromise solution to its dilemma of what to do with Leon Trotzky, the Russian exile whose banishment from the Soviet Government demanded because of terroristic activities.
The Cabinet, after earlier indications Trotzky would not be expelled from the country, determined to isolate him under a special guard.
"He may receive visitors," it decided, "only after he has received permission in each case from the government office of passports. He may not use the telephone and telegrams are to be under supervision."
