The Charlottetown District meeting of the Methodist Church re-opened its session in the First Methodist Church at nine o'clock Thursday morning, Rev. William Harrison in the chair.

After devotional exercises ballot was taken for Journal Secretary, and Rev. E. E. Styles was elected. Rev. E. S. Weeks was appointed Statistical Secretary. Rev. Hugh Miller was named as assistant to Statistical Secretary.

After following were appointed as auditing committee: Rev. H. E. Thomas, Percy Rowe.

The following resolution in connection with the extension of the work of God was adopted: We desire to express once more our sense of gratitude to our Gracious Covenant-keeping God for His favor and guidance during the year that has passed, and for any measure of success that has attended our labors. The brethren we believe have been diligent in their calling on their respective fields, and faithfully preached the Word. To some extent the work has unavoidably suffered by reason of the very severe and broken weather of the late winter and early spring; the roads often being in an impassable condition, rendering it difficult for the people to meet and preventing the ministers from keeping their appointments; this prejudicially affects the finances, and worked against us in other ways.

We feel very deeply the need of a deeper work of Divine Grace operating in the hearts of both pastors and people, and a waiting upon God for a fresh baptism of His holy spirit for life and service. We also commend the recent legislation of General Conference respecting District visitors and that they be appointed where practicable; we believe that, if this is efficiently carried out, it will greatly help the Church by promoting the spiritual life and growth of its members.

EVENING SESSION

After devotions the communication from Montague Circuit to the annual Conference was considered, and was forwarded to the annual Conference. A communication from the Vernon River Circuit was considered at length and finally forwarded to the annual Conference.

The Basis of Union, as presented by the committee representing the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches, was discussed very fully, and when the vote was taken on said Basis, it was unanimous in favor of the Basis.

This resolution, as well as the resolution regarding the Ne Gernere decree, was passed as appeared in yesterday's issue.

The following resolution regarding Rev. H. E. Thomas' removal from his present pastorate was passed: Whereas the Rev. H. E. Thomas, who has for the past several years been a member of this District and pastor of the church where we are now assembled, is about to move to another Province, this District would take this opportunity of expressing its regret at his prospective removal and also our appreciation of him as a brother and wish him all success on his new field of labor.

\$2,000 DOLLHOUSE IS GIFT TO QUINCY G.R.L.

BOSTON, June 7.—What is probably the most luxurious doll house ever constructed has been completed by Timothy Moriarty, of No. 41 German Avenue, Quincy Point. The cost of the doll house is estimated at \$2,000. Moriarty, who is an expert cabinet-maker, has been working for two years on the house. It was built for his sixteen-year old daughter Mary, a student in the Quincy high school. This is the second doll house Mary's father built for her. The first one was constructed about nine years ago. It cost \$900. She uses it now as a storehouse for the furniture of the new house.

The house contains nine rooms and is five feet and three and a half wide exclusive of the front and rear reception room, parlor, dining room, kitchen, library bath and three chambers.

The interior of the house is finished in mahogany. The latest panel adorns the walls of the reception parlor. Every room is lighted by electricity and heated by steam. Leaded glass panes of different designs are used as windows.

The front door has three panels with French plate glass. Electric bells are on the front and rear entrance doors. Every room is furnished appropriately. Each piece of furniture is hand made. There are thirty pieces of furniture. The kitchen contains a cooking and gas range, two set tubs and hot water boiler. The bathroom contains a tub, water closet and shelves and mantelpiece in every room. The dining room has the latest made china cabinet.

The best of white pine clapboards have been used. The roof is shingled with real red cedar shingles. The body of the house has been painted with five coats of yellow paint. The roof is green and the trimmings white. The blinds are painted the regeneration green.

The front piazza is constructed of paneled mahogany. Three beautiful columns support the roof of the piazza. The cellar is constructed of imitation brick. The chimney is constructed of wood, painted brick color.

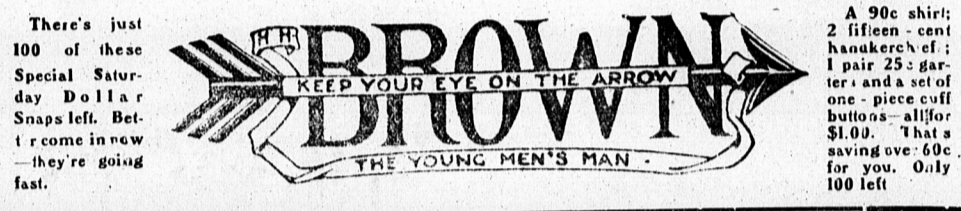
