This was followed by a discussion on same, with particular reference to the experiments assigned by several teachers and useful text books were suggested to aid in the teaching of Geography. The President then announced that the next meeting would be held at the same time on Friday, November 15th, and that "Nature Study" would be the topic for discussion. The meeting then adjourned.

## Parliament To Hear Details From Gov't

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—(CP)—Parliament is to hear a detailed account of the administration's performance both in domestic and international fields. The first review is expected to be given at a session when Prime Minister Mackenzie King speaks in the debate on the address in reply to the Throne Speech.

Mr. King will follow Conservative Leader Hanson who opens the debate in what will be a commentary on his reactions to the Government's conduct during the past six months. He will probably ask some pointed questions on certain aspects of the war effort.

As the debate proceeds there probably will be a review of his own department by the Opposition party. Leaders of the Opposition party have already given evidence that they intend to obtain more information from the government than they have in the past.
