The Store Keeper regulates the quantity. He heard no complaint from persons capable of making the same. He believed the Trustees would do what was best. The Trustees always go through the Hospital, examine the beds and the rooms. The best costs at the present time six cents a pound.

Mr. McPhail recalled—He knew nothing of tinted meat being received at the Asylum. He heard the report but did not know anything about it. The attendants have called his attention to it.

To Mr. McEchern—He did not know whether the report that the Matron excites the patients is true or not. The Matron is doing as well as one could expect. She takes patients down to take meals with her. The Matron had tried to win Mrs. McGougan by kindness in extra food. There is no difference in the patients. There are some of the attendants impertinent. One of the attendants can't write.

Hon. Jas. R. McLean—There is an impression that Dr. Fraser did not receive special medical attendance prior to his death.

Mr. McPhail said he did not know whether the doctor gave medicine or not. The records would show. He would submit the record if the Commission said so.

Mr. S. Blanchard, sworn—He is a member of the Board of Trustees. For the first year he used to go once a month. This year he did not make as many visits as he would like. He went through all the wards and saw the patients. He saw the rooms but did not hear of the windows being leaky. He saw the provisions and ex-

### PASTOR RESIGNS

Accepts Chair in Lincoln University.

LEAVES CHESTER JAN. 1

His Departure Regretted—Is a Son of D. A. McLeod Eidon.

Announcement was made yesterday by the session of the Third Presbyterian Church that the pastor Rev. Malcolm J. McLeod, had again resigned his pastorate. This time the decision is final, the resignation to take effect on the first of the coming year. Mr. McLeod will retire from active work in the ministry, having accepted the professorship of Greek in Lincoln University. He is an earnest and conscientious Christian worker, an eloquent and impassioned speaker and a deep student of theology. The Third Church has prospered remarkably under his ministrations, the present handsome and substantial edifice on Broad street being the result mainly of his zealous effort and the force of his popularity. He first assumed the spiritual charge of the congregation when they met for worship in the edifice on Upland street, near Twelfth, but that soon became too small to accommodate the large number who flocked there at every service to enjoy and profit by his eloquence and depth of thought.

During his pastorate Mr. McLeod has met with marked success. He has

examined the food at tea time. He had received a complaint about the tobacco. The Trustees have been diligent and the repairs were taken up by members of the Government on the Trustee Board. At a meeting held some time ago 20 idiots were selected to be sent home. He believed that some of the parents could take charge of these cases. Miss Matilda McInnis was an applicant for the position of matron. She had been an attendant.

The commission adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning.
