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TWO BIG FEATURES AT THE PRINCE EDWARD

Final Week of Radio Talking Pictures, Presenting Arthur Donaldson Versatile Dramatic Actor in an Artistic Interpretation of Five Different Characters in "Retribution."

This week closes the engagement of Arthur Donaldson, one of America's foremost dramatic actors, in "Retribution" Mr. Donaldson interprets five different characters each entirely distinct from the other, in a masterly manner.

For nineteen years he continued the search, selling, in the meantime all his precious mementos of happier days to pay detectives. At the time the story opens, he is living in a cheap boarding house near the Bowery, teaching music to the children of the neighborhood and playing evenings in a medicine show orchestra.

Then he meets his daughter, who has been brought up in luxury by the man who betrayed him, and is about to marry into one of New York's most distinguished families.

He goes to her home to give her piano lessons and hears her tell of her life, and of her mother who has died. But he does not let her know who he is because he is afraid of spoiling her chance for happiness.

There is infinite sadness in the theme, and Alex Francis in the role of the lonely old man has done a beautiful piece of work. Lois Moran, as the daughter, is no less perfectly cast, and Neil Hamilton, Norman Trevor, Charles Lane and Kathleen Kerrigan provide excellent support.

The climax is reached in that dramatic scene and made famous on the stage by David Warfield, when the real father and the foster father meet and clash with all the accumulated bitterness of the years between them.

It is superbly directed, and Alex Francis achieves in it the best bit of emotional acting he ever has done in a long career of character playing.

The picture is well worth seeing, both by those who remember the stage play, and those too young to remember it.

The music by the Prince Edward Orchestra adds greatly to the enjoyment of the featured picture.

Moved by Robert Agnew and seconded by W. H. Hayter. Messrs. Brodie, Hayter and MacLean eulogized on this resolution all three speaking eloquently on the part played by our soldiers in the Great War.

WHEREAS our Federal Government is spending large sums of money for immigration and we of this Province are receiving no benefit therefrom and our young men are leaving home on account of conditions here—and as we contend that no immigrants are equal to the home product. Be it therefore resolved that some means be devised whereby any young man desiring to remain in this Province may procure financial help at a lower rate of interest than is at present available.

RESOLVED that the thanks of the Central Farmers Institute be tendered the press for the splendid reports of all meetings of the Institute.

Moved by C. E. McKenzie, seconded by R. A. Proffitt.

RESOLVED and passed by the King George Institute regarding the Murray Harbor Railway. WHEREAS the Canadian National Railway has not yet been widened to standard gauge. And whereas on account of this freight going abroad has to be transferred from narrow to standard gauge cars, causing inconvenience and loss to shippers. It is therefore resolved that the Southern Kings Egg Circle in annual meeting urgently request that the Murray Harbor Railway be widened to standard gauge in time for shipment of produce in 1927.

MORNING SESSION

The minutes of the previous meeting of the Institute were read and approved as was the financial statement.

The President of the Central Farmers' Institute presented his report as follows: Gentlemen,—

Another year has passed since we last assembled as a Central Farmers' Institute. In looking back over the record of the past year one cannot help but realize that it has been one of the most successful in the history of our province.

Notwithstanding this large measure of success, many of the farmers have had their disappointments and losses, and at this time we remember our Secretary, Mr. C. E. MacKenzie, who has been called upon to undergo a sad bereavement in the death of his wife. I wish, on behalf of this Institute to extend to him our heartfelt sympathy.

In looking over our statistics for last year, I note a slight decrease in membership, caused, I feel, by circumstances which can be easily remedied. At the present time the minimum membership of an Institute is thirty, with a quorum of seven. Could these numbers not be reduced, thus making it possible to organize in small centres? Another reason for lack of interest in both our central and local Institutes is that many different associations have been formed which are carrying on business independent of Institutes. I would like to see more co-operation in the different lines of agriculture and would suggest that our executive, whoever they may be for the coming year, work in conjunction with the executives of the other associations, in drafting a program for Farmers' Week that can be carried through under the direction of one organization.

It is the purpose of the Central Farmers' Institute to educate the farmers so that they may be efficient along every line of agriculture, and should it not caution them with regard to too much specialization? The fact that one farmer, having a soil suited to growing potatoes, and situated near a railway station, can specialize and make money should be no inducement to another farmer with a heavy clay soil, and living fifteen miles from a shipping point, to try to do likewise.

It is impossible for me at this time to go into details of the different lines of agriculture. I can only mention briefly some of the important matters we should discuss.

The raising of Clydesdale horses in this province at the present time is almost extinct. For what reason? Can we not in some way induce some farmers in the importing of some good sires and the raising of some good horses? The dairymen of this province are steadily making progress. We find that the average production per cow has increased nearly fifty per cent. in the last few years. To insure a still further increase in production the breeders must use the very best sires available who have become famous through the use of the Babcock tester and the milk scale.

Judging by the numbers of selected bacon hogs that are being offered through the different sheeping clubs the Swine Breeders Association is doing good work, but there is still room for improvement.

The Egg and Poultry Association too is doing very effective work in educating the people of this province in the marketing of eggs and raising of poultry. But there is one branch of our live stock which is being neglected more than any other and that is our sheep. Many of the island farmers are doing away with sheep rather than fence. Can we not devote a little more time and effort to the encouragement of sheep raising in our province?

There are a few matters indirectly connected with agriculture that I feel this Central Farmers' Institute should take into consideration, for instance, revaluation of soldiers' farms, and immigration. We know that there are young men leaving their farms today because they were purchased at an enormous price after the war, and these men are unable to pay seven per cent. interest. In this connection I would suggest the starting of a fund by the Department of Agriculture or the Government whereby these young men could get money at a lower rate of interest.

The Government of Ottawa is spending large sums of money for immigration in the West while we are receiving very little for that purpose, and many of our young men are leaving the farms. Could we not get a share of this allowance and use it to encourage our own boys to remain in the province? They are more efficient than any we can import.

In conclusion I wish to commend the different associations for the work they have accomplished during the past year and hope that in the future they will not be satisfied with a small measure of success, but ever strive to bring the agriculture of this province to a higher standard. There is a great tendency in this age to tackle the job that will return the greatest cash dividends, but let intelligent farmers be carried away too much with this idea. To my mind it is far more important to figure on a future for the young life of our Island than on a bank account.

If I hope that all the delegates present will enter freely into the discussion of the problems I have mentioned and thus we may arrive at some definite conclusion regarding each one.
