**Brooder Stoves and Chick
Club Policy**
The Department of Agriculture has decided dur-
ing this season to provide half the cost of brooder
stoves. This will apply only to parties who have not,
up to the present, used brooder stoves and who, since
last August, have built a new brooder house of a
standard satisfactory to our Department and the In-
specter, Mr. F. M. Nash. After this building has been
approved and the receipt for the purchase of a
brooder stove forwarded to the Department of Agri-
culture, one-half the cost of the stove will be paid.
Under the Chick Club Policy three members only
will be permitted to become members from any one
family. A premium of four dollars per hundred chicks
will be paid by the Department for members of Boys'
and Girls' Chick Clubs but no one member will be paid
on over two hundred chicks and payments will not be
made on over three hundred chicks per family.

**ONE OUTSTANDING CAUSE OF
STOMACH AND INTESTINAL
ULCER**
One of the mistakes often made
is to wait too long before under-
going an operation that has been
shown to be necessary. During the
days of wait that follow the con-
dition is gradually becoming worse
and the dread of the operation is
lowering the defensive forces of the
body. Then when operation is per-
formed the results are not all that
was expected or hoped for. The
very fact that the patient has the
operation hanging over him inter-
feres with the proper working of
the body processes—digestion, heart
rate, nerve reaction, and others.
While we are all familiar with

we are undergoing any emotional
upsetment, we often fail to remem-
ber that every other process, par-
ticularly digestion, is disturbed.

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lived to be due to a considerable
extent to nervousness and emo-
tional disturbances is ulcer of the
stomach (gastric ulcer) and ulcer
of the first part of the small in-
testine adjoining the stomach—
duodenal (duodenal ulcer).
"The fact that among large
groups of persons living in the
same climate and under the same
standards of life, ulcer develops in
only a few, shows that ulcer is not
due to 'outside' conditions or fac-
tors but to some 'inside' factor.
The importance of individual ten-
dency or predisposition is shown in
the number of slender individuals
with this blood who suffer with
ulcers." These individuals are usually
of the worried or anxious type
and are upset by circumstances
that would not bother others. The
upsetment interferes with the ner-
vous impulses going from brain to
stomach and disturbs the move-
ments of the stomach as it churns
the food and also causes more
stomach digestive juice to be man-
ufactured than is needed. This
means that even if ulcer is cured
by medicine or diet, or actually re-
moved by operation, these patients,
because of their nervousness and
their emotional disposition, will
cause another ulcer to grow or de-
velop.
The thought then is that while
medicine and diet will heal the
great majority of stomach and in-
testinal ulcers, to prevent ulcers re-

burning or new ones from develop-
ing, the patient must learn to ac-
quire calmness of spirit and not
let little things upset him.

**S. AFRICAN LABOR
MAY FIGHT NAZIS**
JOHANNESBURG, March 13—
(CP-Reuters)—Resolutions urg-
ing a fight against Nazism in
South Africa have been set out
in the preliminary agenda for the
Trades and Labor Council's na-
tional executive committee confer-
ence, to be held at Kimberley,
April 10 to 14.
The Native Trade Assistants'
Union wants the incoming na-
tional executive council to take
steps to alter by propaganda the
mentality of Fascism prevailing
among certain sections of workers
in the ranks of affiliated bodies.
It also wants the council to "re-
sist in every possible manner the
attempt of Germany to obtain the
return of her former colonies in
Africa." The Tailoring Workers'
Industrial Union will move a simi-
lar resolution.
A strongly-worded resolution
will be moved by the General
Workers' Union delegates, protest-
ing against any attempt to return
or cede any territory on the Afri-
can continent to Germany.
