ISLAND PRODUCE IN HALIFAX.—The market for P. E. Island produce in Halifax is glutted at the moment, and there is very little doing, as buyers have pretty well satisfied their current needs and it is too early yet to store stock for over winter trade, says the Maritime Merchant. It will be three weeks or a month yet before vessels commence to arrive with the late potatoes and the stock at present in the market has come forward by rail. The last price paid, we understand, ran from \$1.25 to \$1.35 per 90-lb. bag, and some sales are said to have been made at even less than that.

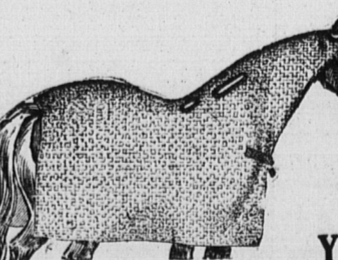
SOLDIERS PROUD OF WOMEN'S BATTALION
