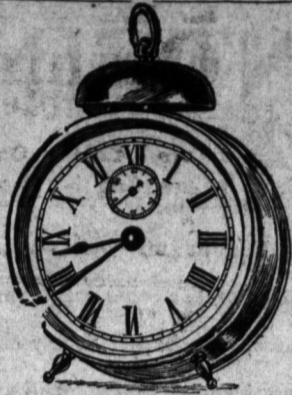

With his assistance an attempt will be made to find the location of the break in the cable. In the meantime the Island is without telegraphic communication, and until it is discovered where the cable is parted it will be impossible to determine how long the present condition of affairs will last. Some messages are received daily through the medium of the wireless installations on the winter steamers but this method is not capable of rendering much relief.

The second meeting arranged for the Week of Prayer took place in the Baptist Church last night, and the building was crowded to the doors by members of the various Protestant denominations in the City.
