The meeting closed with a hearty vote of thanks to the lecturer.

A. last evening at the call of the Ministerial Association to consider the extension of the King's Business Evangelistic Mission throughout the province. The object of this organization is to assist in any feasible way pastors and congregations throughout the province who may wish to arrange for or conduct a series of evangelistic services. In a tabulated statement published in yesterday's issue of the St. John Telegraph that paper states that New Brunswick leads all provinces in Canada in the quantity of potatoes grown last season. New Brunswick's yield per acre was 209 bushels, Nova Scotia, 207; and P.E. Island, 198.88. The total yield is given as follows: New Brunswick, 12,247,000; Nova Scotia, 9,098,000, and P. E. Island, 5,761,000.
