Appeals To Lords For Quick Approval Of Loan From U. S.

(By The Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Dec. 17.—Lord Pethick-Lawrence today asked the House of Lords for quick approval of the terms of the projected \$4,000,000,000 United States loan, warning that the alternative was British isolation and "a quarrel with America."

Moving adoption of the Government's resolutions covering the loan and the Bretton Woods bank plan, Lord Pethick-Lawrence, Secretary of State for India, soborly told the House:

"I beg of any of you contemplating voting against this agreement, to weigh carefully before doing so, what will be the consequences of its rejection. It will mean not merely a quarrel with

America, but the end of all co-operation."
 The House of Commons has already approved the financial agreement, by which the Anglo-American conference in Washington tied the Bretton Woods plan to the loan. The loan itself must still be approved by the United States Congress.

Lord Beaverbrook, principal critic of the loan and the Bretton Woods plan, withdrew his amendment to reject both measures, but associates said he would still oppose when final division comes tomorrow night.

Most Conservatives were expected to abstain from voting.

"YOUR CITY AND OURS"

A feature conducted by the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Question 4—How large do you think the City debt is—\$500,000, 1 million, 2 million or more?

The audit report for the year ended December 31st, 1944, as follows: "The net debt of the City, that is debentures outstanding, bank overdrafts, accounts payable, et cetera, less sinking fund investments, came to hand and at Banks was—December 31st 1944—\$1,976,729.21.

The recent poll conducted by the Junior Chamber of Commerce showed that only 17% of our citizens have a reasonably correct knowledge of the debt of our City. How many, we wonder, have any idea as to how we are paying off our debts? From the auditors' report for year ending December 31st, 1944, which is quoted below for your information, it would appear that provision for payment of 50% of a substantial portion of expenditures incurred twenty and twenty-five years ago is being made, and even that provision is not being made in care of adequately. The remaining 50% apparently will be passed on for future payment by citizens, possibly a large number of whom will have received little or no benefit from the original expenditures.

As mentioned above, the auditors' report reads in part as follows: "See page 58 of 1944 City report. Sinking fund requirements we compute to be \$440,819.17 and \$9,902.86 is required to bring the funds up to the minimum requirements. These minimum requirements are based on:—

"Refunding 50% of all twenty and twenty-five year issues, except refunding issues subsequent to 1934 which are to be retired in 1944.

Yes citizens—this is your City and ours—your business and ours, and we urge you to read and appreciate something more of what goes on!
