TO MEET COLONIES.

OTTAWA, March 31—Canada's preparedness to confer with the other British overseas dominions on matters of preferential trade, was made plain by Hon. Mr. Fielding in the course of an interesting discussion in the Commons yesterday. "We were asked by the Imperial authorities," said Mr. Fielding, "if we would be willing to meet the West Indian colonies in conference in reference to a report of the commission. We replied that as soon as the several colonies were ready, we would meet them. So far only one colony, British Guiana, has offered to meet us. We stand ready to meet them whenever the several colonies are ready to do so."
