CHEAP ELECTRIC POWER.

Under the Ontario Government's plan of providing electric power from Niagara Falls for use in Toronto and all the cities, towns and villages between Toronto and Niagara, a great deal of interest has been created in what electricity can do for industries great and small. That the big industries will use cheap electric power extensively as soon as it is available goes with the saying. The Toronto World in an interesting article sets forth what can be done in small industries, with only fifty cents worth of electricity at the stipulated rate of ten cents per kilowatt hour. Here is the list:

Light an ordinary barn or stable with three 16-candle power lamps one hour every night for 30 nights.

With a small motor attached to the washing machine and wringer 50 cents' worth of electricity will do eight washings.

It will also do two weeks' ironing, using a six-pound iron.

An electric fan can be operated three and one-half hours a day for 30 days for 50 cents.

Two weeks' sewing can be done on the motor-driven sewing machine for the same price.

It will light the porch light for three hours every night for two months.

Fifty cents will pay for the current consumed in using the electric heating pad three hours every night for 30 nights.

It will grind 1,125 pounds of coffee; broil 30 steaks; cook 20 rarebits in the electric chafing dish; fry 400 eggs.

It will run the blacksmith's forge blower for a week.

It will hoist 2,000,000 bricks, two stories.

A one-horse power motor will run seven hours at full load for 50 cents.

The World goes on to show that electric power in its adaptation to the service of mankind is yet only in its infancy, but enough is already known to warrant the affirmation that it will some day, and that not distant, be the greatest of boons to the tradesman, the farmer and the ordinary citizen. There is ample warrant for saying that electricity will yet greatly lighten both the work and the expense of running handicrafts, farms and households. And in regard to instant availability for use, in cleanliness, in the facility with which it can be applied and dispensed with so as to avoid waste, it is second to no other form of energy which man has so far conquered to his service.

HON. R. W. SCOTT.

The retirement of Hon. Richard W. Scott from the Liberal cabinet at Ottawa, directs attention to the man and what he has stood for in the public life of the country. Mr. Scott is an old man now, so far as years are concerned, for he was born so long ago as February, 1825. He was therefore eighty-three years of age in February last, but has carried the burdens of life and the cares of state lightly, and even now is younger than many men a quarter of a century his junior. His age has been in Shakespearean phrase,

"As a lusty winter, frosty but kindly, For in his youth he never did apply

Hot and rebellious liquors to his blood."

In a word, he has lived the simple life, a life of honest rectitude, and has from the beginning pursued a faithful public course according to his lights, and holds today the respect of all parties, all classes and creeds in Canada.

Mr. Scott is a son of W. J. Scott, M.D., an army surgeon who served under Wellington in the Peninsular War, and was afterward made Registrar of the county of Grenville, Ontario. He was born and educated at Prescott, studied law in Toronto and was called to the bar sixty years ago. He practised law in Bytown, now Ottawa, and there at twenty-seven years of age he was elected Mayor. Last year D'Arcy Scott has been elected Mayor of the larger Ottawa, succeeding after fifty-five years to the position held in 1852 by the subject of this sketch.

Mr. Scott was elected to the Legislature of old Canada from Ottawa in 1857 and has since been identified with the public life of the country. After the union he was elected to the first Legislature of Ontario in 1867 and in 1871 became Speaker of that body, and later was Commissioner of Crown Lands in the Blake Administration, and that of Sir Oliver Mowat which followed. In 1873 he became Secretary of State in the federal Cabinet led by Mr. Mackenzie, and has held the same portfolio during the past twelve years under Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Since 1874 he has sat in the Senate.

Mr. Scott is most widely known as the author of the Separate School Act of Ontario which he prepared and carried through Parliament in 1863, and the Canada Temperance Act of 1875 which is so commonly spoken of as the Scott Act. In successive Liberal Cabinets he has been the accepted representative of the Irish Roman Catholic element in his party, and as such has been distinguished by his moderate and judicial attitude on all public questions. One might not always be able to agree with him, but all who knew the man have been convinced that his views were conscientiously held. In the later sixties and early seventies of last century it was the writer's privilege as a then elector in Ottawa to know Mr. Scott personally, and to sometimes vote for him at the poll in the open voting fashion of that time. A plain man, a man of the people, honest, always at

work, capable, patriotic and of blameless life. Mr. Scott has set a worthy and noble example in the public life of Canada during more than fifty years past.

There is a large and growing body of electors who while holding mainly with one or the other political party, take the liberty of expressing their opinions freely. Sometimes they think their own party has gone wrong or is doing wrong, or that its policy is unwise in certain matters and they say so. This large class are also the support of the independent press. They are like other men disposed to resent attacks upon themselves, or their class, or the press that speaks for them. They are also conscious of their power, for they hold the balance between parties. The prudent politician, and the discreet party newspaper also, will be careful not to offend the independent voter needlessly. This may serve to show with how little political discretion some party newspaper are conducted. We have yet to learn that offensive epithets applied by a party organ to The Guardian have ever yet proved effective in winning votes for any political leader or candidate.

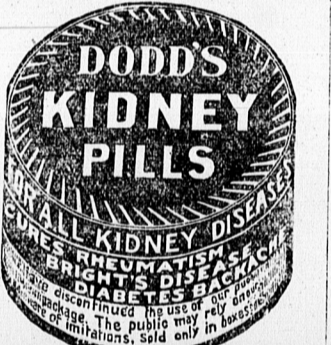
