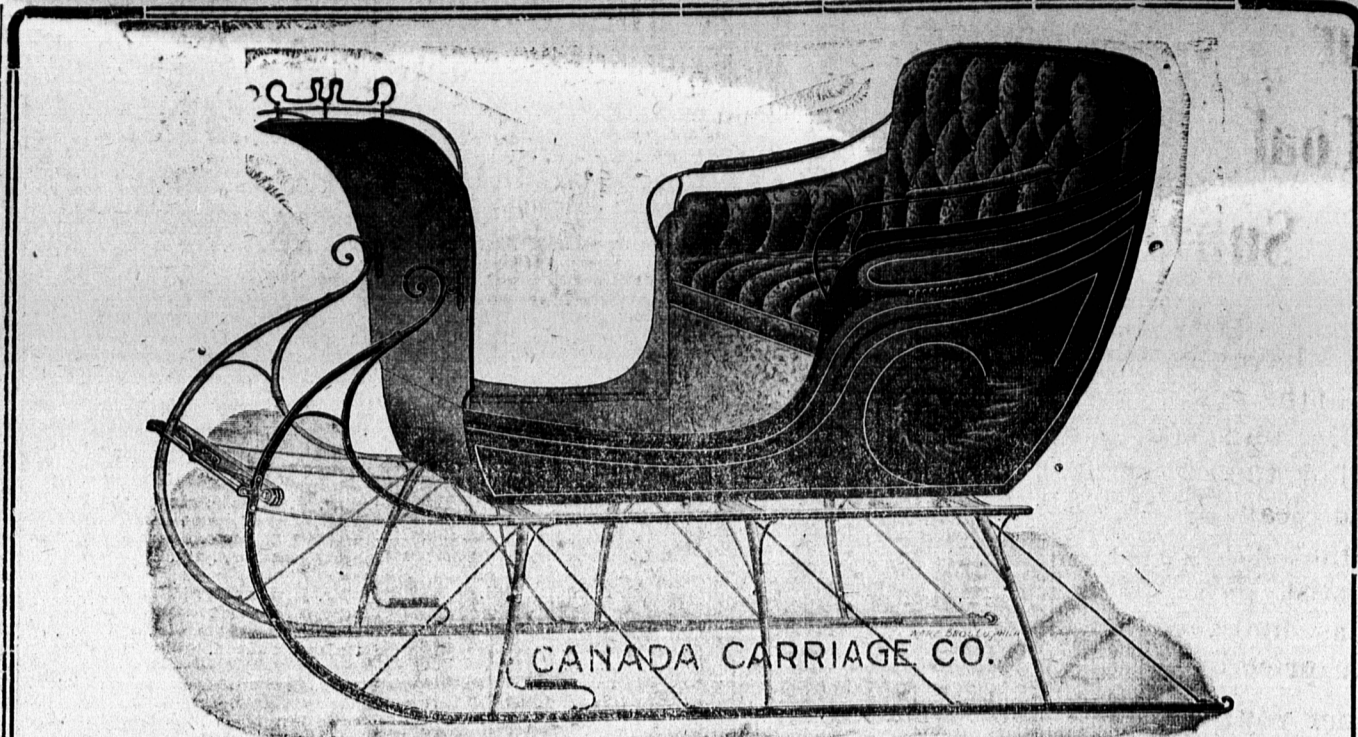

NEW BUILDING.—Rev. George Steel, who is well known in this Province, returned to St. John, Wednesday, after attending a meeting in Sackville of the committee recently appointed by the faculty of Mt. Allison University to consider the matter of raising funds for erecting a new science building, the present one being too small for requirements. It is intended to erect a new building at a cost of from \$50,000 to \$65,000. The present structure will probably be used by the manual training department of the university. It is understood that suggestions were submitted at the meeting but that no definite action had been decided upon. Another meeting will be held before Christmas.

MORE FOXES.—The foxes recently purchased by Dundas parties, among whom were Dr. D. E. Morris, and Messrs. Allan McDonald, John D. McCowan, Edmund Clay and Archibald Gay, were yesterday taken to the Souris ranch, where they will be placed under the care of Mr. Edmund Clay. Mr. Clay is a large shareholder in the company and has had considerable experience in foxes; so that there is no doubt the results he will achieve will be perfectly satisfactory. The foxes are very large, perfectly developed March pups, and are beautifully furred, having just enough silver to make the pelt attractive. These foxes will make a splendid addition to the Souris ranch, which is now stocked with several pairs of exquisite black foxes.

EVANGELINE FOR PANAMA.—In preparation for her winter tourist traffic the Plant liner Evangeline has been floated into the drydock at Halifax for repairs and the Halifax is again at her old berth. This time last year both steamers, Halifax and Evangeline, were at Key West, Florida, entering upon charter with the Peninsular and Occidental Steamship company, plying between Key West, Nassau and Panama. This year the steamers will be operated by the Plant line in tourist traffic on their own hook, the northern terminus being Jacksonville, Florida, the route then lying to Panama. The stimulus to the traffic will be Panama Canal sightseeing. The Halifax and Evangeline leave right after New Year's but the A. W. Perry will stay home, so that no steamer as last year will be substituted during her absence together with the other two ships of the fleet.

MOCK PARLIAMENT.—St. Dunstan's College Mock Parliament held its formal opening on Thursday, W. E. Cameron, member for East Grey, was appointed Speaker and immediately after the Usher of the Black Rod entered the chamber and announced to the Commons that His Excellency, the Governor-General (Rev. P. F. Hughes) was seeking entrance to the chamber. The Governor-General then read the speech from the Throne which foreshadowed many grave and important measures. House then adjourned until next Wednesday night when the debate on the Draft Address will be proceeded with. It is rumored that the Opposition under the capable leadership of Jas. A. Macbougall will strongly object to the Government's program and a very lively sitting is expected. The following are the members of the Government:—Mark R.
