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SEED OATS SHORTAGE

As there is a serious shortage of seed oats in the province, we feel we are forced to make a thorough investigation of the problem in order to ascertain the amount of grain needed to supply the farmers. We are asking all Women's Institutes, Farmers' Clubs, Credit Unions, Study Clubs and all public organizations throughout the province to gather from their members and non-members as well, their requirements, giving names, post office address, the amount of oats needed, and their nearest railway station.

We wish it thoroughly understood that the government is not giving out this grain promiscuously, but it will be given out in such a way that the government will be insured against loss; so that we ask everyone who possibly can to have money on hand to pay for this grain.

We do not wish any delay in regard to this matter, as it may be necessary to obtain a number of cars from outside this province. This is so that we may have an intelligent idea of how much grain is required to satisfy the needs. This information is for the seed merchants as well as for the government so that we may jointly handle the situation.

Under the circumstances, we would strongly urge all farmers to obtain their seed at the earliest possible moment, as we greatly feel there may be undue shortage in this province.

City Council

The following report was submitted at the recent monthly meeting of the City Council on Monday.

POLICE REPORT

Thirty-six arrests were made in Charlottetown during February, the report prepared by Chief of Police Sirwisle said. The report was read by Coun. J. E. Blanchard in the absence of Coun. H. McInyre, chairman of the Police Committee. Criminal breach of trust, 1; drunk and disorderly, 4; drunk and incapable, 21; insanity, 1; theft, 1; vagrancy, 8.

There were three convictions under the Prohibition Act for the unlawful sale or possession of intoxicating liquor, one for keeping a vicious dog, and one for common assault. Eleven owners of radio receiving sets were prosecuted for operating without licences. Ten convictions were recorded with fines ranging from \$5. to \$1. and costs, one case being withdrawn. The information were classified as follows: Criminal breach of trust, 1; drunk and disorderly, 4; drunk and incapable, 21; insanity, 1; theft, 1; vagrancy, 8.

On February 24th the force collected thirty two samples of milk and four of cream from licensed vendors, delivering same to the City Milk and Milk Vendors, contained less than 3 1-2 per cent of butter fat, the offender being prosecuted under the by law respecting milk and milk vendors, a fine of five dollars and costs being imposed.

The following are the amounts collected during the month: Fines and costs: fine imposed under the Prohibition Act \$200.00; Miscellaneous fines and costs collected \$352.00. Total amount collected \$552.00.

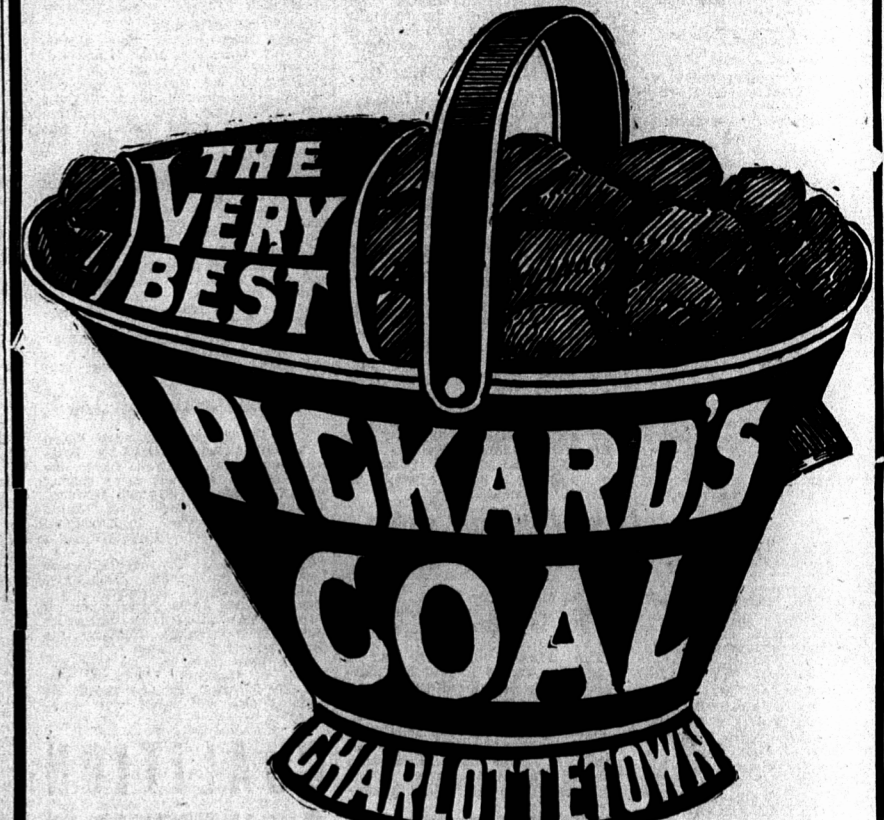
