SAD BEREAVEMENT.—Word has been received of the accidental death, in Roxbury, Mass., on Tuesday last of Ernest Wedge, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wedge formerly of this province. The child was run over by a street car and instantly killed. Mrs. Wedge was formerly Miss Sadie McEachern, Glenfuanan, and has been absent from the province for about fifteen years. Her brother, David, it will be remembered, was killed in Boston by a live electric wire, last fall and his body brought home for burial. Mr. Wedge formerly belonged to 15 Point, Prince County. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents who have been so sorely and suddenly bereaved, and also with their relatives here, especially the aged father and mother of Mrs. Wedge to whom the bereavement is a heavy blow following so soon after the death of their son.
