There he found according to the journal, that four women had been indiscreet in the matter of discussing matters relative to the army. While they were not spies, they showed so little common sense that they were dismissed.

On the other side of the Channel the state of affairs has been more serious. Two nurses were recently found to be out-and-out spies. Both were Americans with German sympathies, according to the "Nursing Mirror" and both, it says were "effectually dealt with."

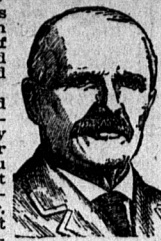

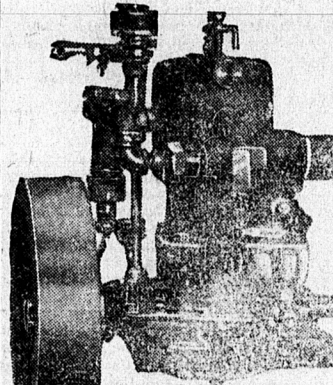

RUSSIA TO TRY CAPTURED ZEPPELIN RAIDERS AT LIBAU.

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Drastic treatment of German air men who hurl bombs upon unfortified cities is proposed today. It is suggested that any Germans captured in attempted air raids upon an unprotected town shall be treated as criminals and tried on murder charges.

The proposal comes from Petrograd, where the Russian officials, incensed over the latest German attempt to bombard Libau from a Zeppelin, have recommended that the crew, captured when the airship fell into the water, be brought before a military court on a charge of attempted murder.
