Contract Bridge

THE FRIENDLY ENEMY

If today's declarer had known that trumps were not going to break, he could have planned a very neat squeeze play, but, as it was, he had to get a little help from the enemy.

South Dealer. 12-23
Both sides vulnerable.
Q 5 A J 10 8

The bidding:
South West North East
1 Pass 3NT Pass
4 Pass 6 Pass

West opened the club king. Obviously, the lead of the diamond ace would have made the contract a laydown. The club ace won—and, to repeat, if South had known that the trumps lay 4-1, he could have squeezed the hand as follows: A club is ruffed by South, a trump is led to dummy, and the last club is ruffed. Now a diamond is led toward the board. West cannot afford to go up with the ace, so the queen wins. Now dummy

leads out the three remaining trumps, drawing East's, while declarer discards two diamonds. This leaves South with his diamond four spades and the diamond jack. East is out of the running. West must hold four spades to stop the suit, and of course the diamond ace for his fifth card. He cannot retain a club. Therefore, South leads a low diamond to the pack, and it is all over. The spade queen is still fit dummy for an entry to the good diamonds. In the actual play, however, South could not know that trumps were divided as they were, so he drew two rounds. Then he ruffed a club, led a diamond to the queen, and though he could draw trumps, as before the squeeze was gone. South discarded a spade and a diamond on the third and fourth trumps; and if West had been alert, he would have kept only three diamonds, the diamond ace and a club. Actually, however he chose to hold all four of his spades, which meant that he had to give up his last club. Thereupon, South simply knocked out the diamond ace—and West was helpless.

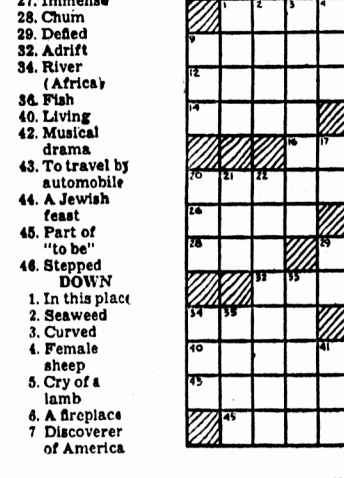

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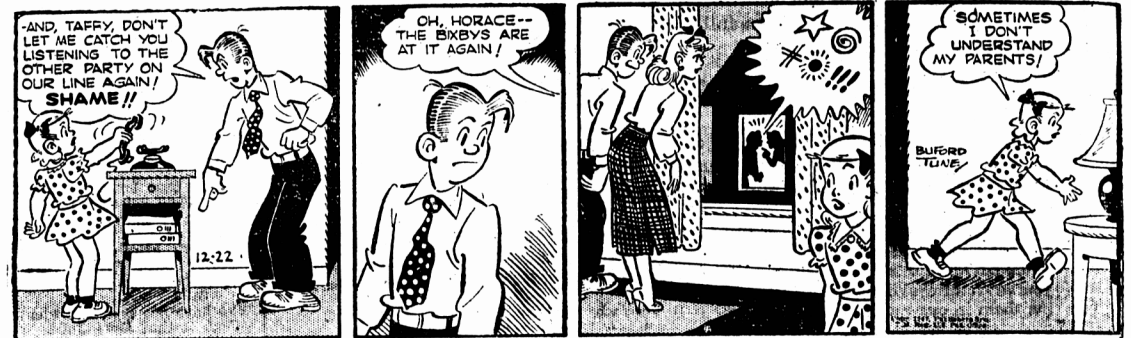

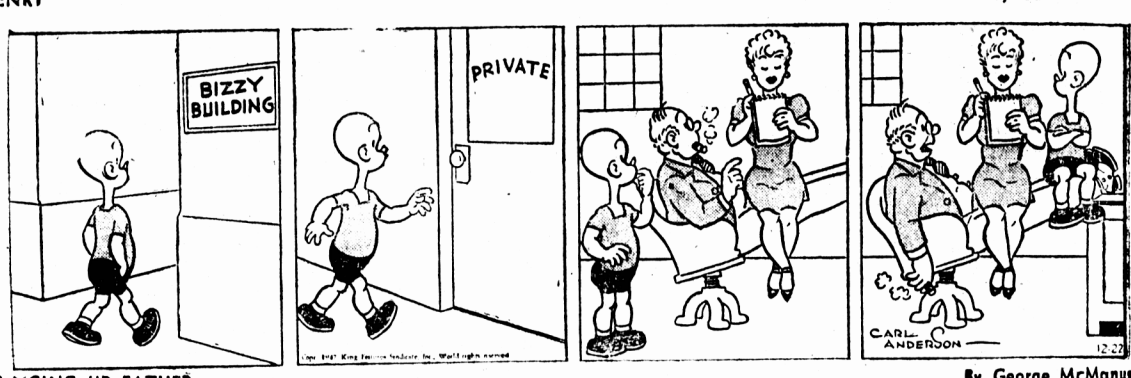
