

AMERICAN BATTLESHIPS OUT OF COMMISSION.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 9.—Accidents reported today to the big battleships Nebraska and Connecticut, engaged with the Atlantic fleet in manoeuvring in Narragansett Bay, will keep both ships out of further duty for some time.

A LITTLE GIRL BURNED TO DEATH.

GLACE BAY, Aug. 9.—Edith M. Batten, the five-year-old child of Elijah and Mrs. Batten, who was severely burned yesterday, died at St. Joseph's hospital at an early hour this morning as a result of the injuries received.

The little girl secured some matches and set fire to her clothing. Before the flames were extinguished by the mother, the child was very severely burned about the body and arms. She was removed to the hospital, where everything possible was done to save the young life, but the injuries proved too severe, and death ensued as stated.

ATTACKED BY VICIOUS DOG.

GLACE BAY, Aug. 9.—Yesterday afternoon while passing through the yard of Neil Stewart's place at Dominion No. 3 Mrs. Alexander Stewart was attacked by Stewart's bull dog and so severely bitten that it was necessary to remove her to St. Joseph's hospital.

The animal caught Mrs. McInnis on the leg and before the dog was released the limb had been fearfully chewed and torn. When attacked, Mrs. McInnis, who is a lady about seventy years of age, was unable to protect herself against the vicious brute. There was no person near at the time of the dog's attack and it was some moments before her cries for help brought assistance. Had the incident happened in a lonely spot the animal might have killed her before assistance could have arrived.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 9.—Nine-year-old Stanley Stewart and his mother, of England, appealing for permission to cross the threshold of the United States to join other members of their family and become American citizens, were ordered deported today.

A special medical board at Quebec pronounced the little fellow feeble-minded. The mother must return to England with him as an accompanying alien, but three other children were permitted to go to their father at Omaha, Neb.

Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, made the thousand mile trip from Washington to Quebec, to see if the sundering of family ties could be prevented. He is said to have been satisfied that no other course was open.

HALIFAX MAN JAILED IN SYDNEY.

SYDNEY, Aug. 9.—Chief of Police MacNeil, of North Sydney, today arrested one Thomas Garoway, of Halifax, at the instance of his wife, Garoway is local agent for the Union Life Assurance Company, and came to North Sydney in May. He went to board at a house run by a woman named Swift. Here it is said he soon got beyond the status of a boarder and became master, providing the funds which kept the house going. His wife in Halifax received little of money from him, and came down to investigate. Garoway smoothed things over, promising to send her five dollars a week. He did this for a couple of weeks ago. His wife again became uneasy and came down a second time. She saw the chief of police and laid information before Stipendiary Archibald on which Garoway was arrested today and lodged in jail. It is not known whether he went through the form of marriage with Mrs. Swift or not, but his wife seems to think he did. The facts will likely be brought out at the preliminary hearing tomorrow.
