Glaring Misstatement By Fisheries Minister Re The Duncan Report

Many Important Recommendations Dealing With Freight Rates Still Unimplemented By King Government, Despite Hon. Cyrus MacMillan's Emphatic Statement To The Contrary At Political Gathering.

At the York political meeting, according to the local Liberal organ, Hon. Cyrus Macmillan stated emphatically that the Duncan Report "has been implemented in full except for the final adjustment of subsidy." If Mr. Macmillan is correctly reported, then he is guilty either of gross ignorance with respect to recommendations to which he himself, as a member of the Duncan Commission, affixed his signature, or he has deliberately attempted to deceive the electors of Queens County from whom he is now soliciting votes as a Liberal candidate. Even with respect to the single series of recommendations dealing with freight rates, Mr. Macmillan's statement is far from the truth.

Still Unimplemented

In the first place, the Duncan Report (page 22) recommended a reduction of 20 per cent on import rates to cover traffic moving from ports in the Mari-

CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE WELL RECEIVED

Souris Meeting Hears
of King Govern-
ment's Discrimina-
tion Against County.

Souris tendered an enthusiastic reception to the Conservative candidate, Hon. John A. MacDonald, on the occasion of the largely attended political meeting there Tuesday evening. Mr. MacDonald was in excellent form and dealt trenchantly with the issues at stake in the forthcoming election.

The Conservative speakers were: Hon. Mr. MacDonald, Senator McLean, and Mr. H. F. McPhee, while Hon. Dr. Grant, Senator Hughes and Premier Lea spoke for the Liberals. Particular interest was created by the speech of Senator Hughes, who gave a little of the intimate history of the inner ring of the Liberal party, and the extent to which the Liberal government had purposely refused to grant to Kings County during the past few years its proper share of the money voted by the Federal Government for public services in the province.

At Kingsboro on the preceding evening a largely attended meeting was held, and here too, the Conservative candidate was warmly received. Supporting Mr. MacDonald on the platform were Senator McLean and Mr. H. D. McLean.

Stirring Reception For Conservatives At Hunter River

Messrs. McLure and Myers Further Strengthen Their Position At Well Attended And Orderly Meeting. Discouraging Reception for Liberal Candidates.

Cyrus Macmillan were seen to sway and fall in a one sided political battle. Can. Workmen Being Driven To Other Countries

States Hon. R. B. Bennett In Pressing His Campaign At New Glasgow Last Night—More Than \$56,000,000 Spent In Coal And Coke In United States Last Year.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., July 9.—Charging that Canadian workmen, especially in the iron and steel industries, had been "driven to other countries," by the policies of the Administration, Hon. R. B. Bennett pressed his campaign here tonight and earlier at Antigonish. At the same time, the Conservative leader emphasized his national highways proposal and promised his strong support to the fishing industry. "To the extent," Mr. Bennett exclaimed, "we bring in one dollar's worth of goods

SHORTAGE OF \$70,000,000 IN THE REVENUE

Of the Australian Commonwealth For The Current Financial Year—New Sensational Tariff Table Announced.

CANNBERRA, Australia, July 9.—A shortage of over \$70,000,000 in the revenue of the Australian Commonwealth for the current fiscal year was disclosed by Premier James Henry Scullin in a Budget statement before the House of Representatives today. The Premier announced a heavy increase in internal taxation and a new table of tariffs which he described as the most sensational in the history of the Commonwealth. Among the increases in custom duties provided in the proposed tariff are the following: Petrol, three pence per gallon; tobacco, six pence per pound; cigarettes, one shilling per pound; cigars, two shillings per pound; films, one penny per foot; newspaper, one pound sterling per ton. Ten percent postal charges on all letters to be increased to two pence from one and one half.

UNITS LEAVE TO PARTICIPATE IN MANOEUVRES

Signallers and Prince Edward Island Highlanders Embark Today For Pictou.

The militia units, which have completed a period of training at Brighton and Victoria Park, break camp today when the headquarters staff, a group of selected local officers, the signalling corps, and the P. E. Island Highlanders leave for Pictou to participate with the militia from Aldershot in the combined military and naval manoeuvres at River John. The P. E. Island Light Horse also break camp today.

The headquarters staff consisting of Lt. Col. C. B. Russel, D. S. O., Camp Commandant, Major H. Logan, R. C. R., Major H. Nobel, R. C. R., Captain Linton, M. C., Captain Wood, R. C., Lt. Hodgson, R. C., will leave on the Hochelaga this afternoon, as will also the Highlanders under the command of Lt. Col. Dawson, No. 2 Company, 6th Div. Signallers, under the command of Major Conrad, proceeds on the Champlain at 8 o'clock this morning. The special officers, Lt. Col. Full, Major Lowther, Major Strong, Major McNevin, and Major Tierney will also leave on the Champlain.

from the United States to replace one dollar's worth of goods that could be manufactured in Canada, we have deprived Canadians of that much work in the development of Canadian industry. Do you realize that under the present policy instead of making steel in Canada we have deprived Canadian miners and steel workers of the chance they deserve and we have driven them to other countries."

One million dollars per day had been spent in the purchase of iron and steel products in the American Republic, he declared. "Think," Mr. Bennett asked, "what the expenditure of one half of that money in this country would mean to Nova Scotia, to Canada." The coal industry, the Dominion Leader stressed, was in the same category and a similar question could be asked. More than \$56,000,000 for coal and coke had been spent last year in the United States, he stressed, giving employment to workmen of another country. To the strains of the Pibroch, Mr. Bennett was heralded to both meetings.

King's Opposition To Federal Grants Beyond All Denial

Prime Minister While Admitting This Government Could Grant "Any Sum Of Money They Desired To The Provinces" Emphatically Refused Further Financial Assistance.

The Liberal candidates and their party organ are obviously alarmed at the favorable effect of Hon. R. B. Bennett's assurance that the federal grants for agricultural and technical training, discontinued by the King Government, will be revived by the Conservative administration when returned to power after July 28th. The endeavor is being made to show that the Prime Minister is not unfavorable to these grants, while the local Liberal organ has gone so far as to deny that they have ever been discontinued.

The facts, however, are easily verified from Hansard. In announcing the discontinuance of the technical grant in Parliament on Feb. 15, 1929, Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Labor, stated that the Agricultural Instruction Act expired some years previously AND WAS EXTENDED FOR ONLY ONE YEAR. The Technical Education Act, which in this Province, through the efforts of Hon. J. D. Stewart, then Premier, was extended to embrace agricultural education, expired in March, 1929. It was amended so as to provide that any balance of the \$10,000,000 originally appropriated and still unexpended should remain available for a period of five years; but the insistent request of Conservative members in the House that a further appropriation should be made in order to continue the grant was positively turned down by the Prime Minister, who stated (Hansard, Feb. 15, 1929, page 173):

"The Government is not in disagreement with hon. gentlemen opposite as to the importance of industrial and technical education. Our only difference is that we believe the time has come when the Provinces themselves should carry on the obligation which they undertook at the time the grants of the Federal Government were originally made to them."

AIR MAIL PILOTS FORCED TO LAND

DAKARA, Senegal, July 9.—Jean Mermoz noted French airman on the first west to east trans Atlantic air mail flight between South America and Africa was forced to come down on the sea when well over half way across today. He and his two companions Leopold Gimme, radio operator and Jean Dabry, navigator, were rescued and the 600 pounds of air-mail which they took aboard on leaving Natal, Brazil yesterday were saved. Mermoz, three hours earlier, had discovered an oil leak which was not serious, but two hours before he came down the oil pressure dropped alarmingly and he sent a wireless message that he was heading toward the despatch boat Phoece, one of several boats patrolling the route in case of emergency. The Phoece, being informed of Mermoz trouble started to the rescue, and met the plane. She stood by and took aboard the three men and the mail. The mail was to be transferred to another dispatch boat and carried at full speed to Africa for relay by plane to Paris. His landing was made after he had been in the air 14 hours and was well advanced on the last half of his trans-Atlantic journey.
