Proceedings In The Legislature

After breaking trail to the Confederation Building yesterday morning in a storm-bound city, some twenty members of the Legislature convened to pass the Prince Edward Island Pharmacy Act, 1949; acts to incorporate the "P.E.I. Arts and Crafts Guild"; "The Trustees of the People's Cemetery, Malpeque," and the "O'Leary Memorial Health Centre."

Speaking on the last-mentioned act, Hon. A.W. Matheson, K.C., Minister of Health and Welfare referred to yesterday's Guardian report of his statement on this bill. He stated that provision might be made in the Fiscal Health grants for the building of such projects, but not for their maintenance. In the absence of Premier J. Walter Jones, who was storm-stayed on his Bunbury farm, Hon. F. A. Large, Attorney-General, steered through committee the remainder of the bill to amend the Fish and Game Protection Act. Progress had been reported on the bill in committee the previous day. The amendment will allow 40 game birds to be taken from the Province instead of the present limit of 12.

Wild foxes will cease to have legal protection during any season of the year. In support, Hon. W. F. Alan Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, cited reports of increasing damage to poultry and lambs by these foxes, stating that they were getting "out of all bounds on the Island."

J. P. Matheson (2nd Queen's) supported the move to control the foxes and O.C. Baker (4th Prince) suggested a bounty on them. The four day hunting licence for non-residents will be cancelled by the new act.

The open season for snaring rabbits will open one month earlier, starting on November 1 instead of November 30.

The amendment will allow automatic and pump-repeating shot guns to carry three shells instead of the present limit of two. Because of the repeated amendments, William Hughes (5th Kings) called for a consolidation of the Act. The Attorney-General stated that he understood an office consolidation would be available to the public this summer.

Mr. Matheson (2nd Queen's) asked for the reason the administration of the Act was being changed from the Department of Agriculture to that of the new Department of Industry and Natural Resources. In reply, Hon. Mr. Matheson commended the Department of Agriculture on its administration of the Act. Contrary to the suggestion from the member opposite, the government did not want to antagonize the country people. This change was simply for "better government. He added that Mr. Rodd would be on the Island this summer, guiding the administration of this Act through the new department.

D. L. Matheson, E. C. (5th Queen's) referred to the confusion on the previous day, over the vote on the question of killing owls. He felt that the matter had not had proper consideration because of the confusion in procedure. Discussion arose on a request for information by Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, Leader of the Opposition, regarding the fouling of fishing ponds by gravel washing operations. Both the Minister of Public Works and Highways and Hon. A. W. Matheson replied and deplored the situation. The latter felt that civil action could be taken in common law by those owning the fishing rights. Hon. W. F. Alan Stewart stated that in the past, when his department had administration of the Act, mill and pond owners co-operated with the department in maintenance of dams. The bill passed through committee without amendments.

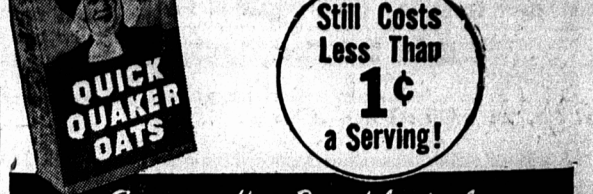


