CHURCH SERVICES

ST. JAMES CHURCH

Yesterday evening Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, B. D. delivered the last of his series of sermons on "Church Going". The subject was "What Can I Do For The Church," the text was taken from Romans 12: 1-I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. During the service the anthem "Take Up Thy Cross" was beautifully rendered by the choir, the solo part being taken by Miss Jacqueline MacDonald.

The anthem at the morning service was "How Lovely Are They Dwellings" (Maker). It was intimated that the boy choirists would take part at both services next Sunday.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH

Large congregations present at the Baptist Church morning and evening heard two very impressive sermons delivered by the minister, Rev. A. C. Vincent, D. D. The subject of the morning sermon was "Living unto God," the speaker basing his thought on Romans 6, 11. "Even so reckon ye also yourselves to be dead unto sin, but alive unto God in Christ Jesus." St. Paul was deeply interested in the relation of Sin and Law, Law and Grace, Sin and Grace. In the rich epistle to the Romans these are discussed with wealth of illustration, clarity and power. Dead to Sin. How many of us have so let Christ master our lives that we may truly say we are "dead unto sin?" Most of us cannot make good such a claim if we speak truly. Herein lies the greatest weakness of the Church. When we can say this-when we can make this claim with humble sincerity a new day shall dawn for the Church and for the world. The world may co-trovert your statement of faith, but against the power of a changed, regenerated life there is no argument. Alive unto God. Not death to sin alone is enough, but because we are dead unto sin every talent, every power we have should be consecrated to God. Tongues to tell the tale of redeeming love, hands for activity in service to God and in ministry to men, eyes to see to all things the glory of God, ears to hear His voice, through His word, through the murmuring winds, in the sound of His many waters. This life is ours through Jesus Christ our Lord. Only through a complete surrender, an absolute loyalty to Jesus may we attain to the riches of the life unto God. This way lies success as individual Christians and as the Church universal, Christ and His kingdom have the premier claim, success not measured by the material, but by spiritual power. The battle with sin is a fight unto the death, either through Christ we conquer sin, or sin will conquer us, there is no middle way. Let us "live unto God in Christ Jesus."

The subject of the very impressive and thoughtful evening sermon was "Three Gardens," a meditation on Sin, Redemption, Reward. The music of the day included Hatton's "Like as a Father," Lang's "I hear thy voice," with the solo taken by Mrs. H. S. Henderson. Announcement was made of the usual activities of the Church with special invitation to the mid week service for Wednesday at 7.30. Attention was directed to the plea of the Prime Minister for universal and generous co-operation in the support of this week's collection for the needs arising out of present difficult conditions.

Another reminder that the Christmas spirit is with us was given by the Sunday School. The service was held in the Church auditorium. There were fully 450 present. It was the school's white gift Sunday. The C. G. I. T. occupied the choir seats. The programme was both interesting and enjoyable. The gifts presented were numerous and valuable and the collection including cash, goods, groceries and orders in all amounted to \$291.09, all of which goes to the Relief Committee of the church. The moderator, accompanied by Dr. Eryce, chairman of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, was in the Maritimes last week. Rev. Dr. Ramsay attended the conference held at Amherst. The moderator has put up to the people of the Maritimes a "Challenge Extraordinary" to cope with conditions arising out of the economic situation and to aid churches in the Prairie Provinces to enable them to carry on. The people of Trinity are not wealthy but they are very loyal to our Lord and to our Church.

There has been many appeals presented which were generously responded to. The great, testing time is now upon us. Rev. Mr. Brown delivered the sermon at the morning service, speaking from the text 1 John 3-16, "Hereby perceive we the love of God because He laid down His life for us and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren." The Cross exemplifies God's love and God's law. God is love and He gave to live to love and to love is to give. Give ourselves to others. That is the constitution of the world. God's law for life is the law of giving. If Christ's kingdom is to come we must exemplify in our own lives the love of giving.

In the evening Rev. Dr. Ramsay spoke from the text 2 Cor. 8-9 "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ that though he became poor for our sakes he became poor that ye through his poverty might be rich." It is impossible to give here a synopsis of Dr. Ramsay's excellent address. It was a comprehensive, stirring and convincing appeal to accept the challenge of the moderator and General Council of the Church so that \$325,000 may be raised this year over and above the regular amount that our Church is pledged to give for Missionary and Maintenance purposes.

The service of praise under the direction of Prof. Kendall was in keeping with the general theme of the day, Christian Stewardship. The soloist was Mr. T. W. Bentley who sang "The Lord is in His Holy



Death Of Mr. J. D. Goss

There passed away early on Saturday morning one of Summerside's most highly respected and outstanding citizens, Mr. John D. Goss, at the advanced age of 83 years, after an illness of about a year's duration. Mr. Goss was a native of Hunter River and was the son of the late Henry Goss, of that place. In his early years he lived in St. John N.B., but came to Summerside over fifty years ago and until his health failed he worked with untiring zeal for the good of the community. Few men in Summerside were so well liked, he always had a smile, especially for the kiddies. For many years he served on the Town Council, being re-elected several times. He was best known perhaps for his work in the Y. M. C. A. of which he was a chartered member. Up to the time of the closing of the Summerside branch three years ago, he was its prime mover and when he was younger, the Y. M. C. A. in Summerside was a very active society under his direction. He was for fifty years a member of the Hiram and Lebanon Masonic Lodge, No. 3, of Summerside and was for several years Worshipful Master and up to the time of his death fulfilled the office of treasurer with every satisfaction.

His business career was one of long and faithful service with Messrs. F. W. Strong and Co., since 1882 until last year when owing to ill health and advancing years he was obliged to give up, much to his regret, as he was a very active worker. Before that time he worked first with Mr. Hillard Baker, in 1875, one of Summerside's earliest produce houses. When Mr. Baker failed, he became associated with the well known firm of Robert H. McLeod, who carried on a large agricultural machine and produce business, now running under the name of Messrs. Rogers and Arnett.

In Mr. Goss, Summerside has lost a citizen who will always be remembered as one of the kindest of men and one who loved the town and did his best to further its growth. He was a strong worker for the cause of temperance and was an elder in the Trinity United Church. He married Miss Goodair, of Baie Verte, of N. B., who predeceased him some years ago. Since that time his niece, Miss Thelma Allen, has lived with him and tenderly nursed him in his last illness. Besides his niece, there are left to mourn, two brothers, William, in Malden, Mass.; George, in Canton, Mass.; and one sister, Mrs. Annie Pulley, of Bayfield, N. B., to whom sympathy is extended.

The funeral will take place at one o'clock today at the United Church, Summerside.-S.

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
