M-G-M'S "THIRTY SECONDS OVER TOKYO"

Epic Film Based on Best-Seller Book

"Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo," which Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer is presenting at the Prince Edward Theatre, is a film of epic proportions. Lawson himself is portrayed by Van Johnson; Corporal (now Staff Sergeant) Thaxter by Robert ("Private Hargrove") Walker, and Ellen Lawson by Phyllis Thaxter, a face and name new to moviedom but destined for stardom if her present performance is any criterion.

"Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo" tells of the Doolittle mission, what preceded it and what followed it, in deeply human terms. Ted Lawson's training for the great task and his fleeting moments with his Ellen form the basis for what is certainly one of the most stirring pictures in many, many months.

There are several other newcomers in the excellent performances to rival those of the leading players.

"Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo" is altogether a "must" picture. By all means go to see it.

R. C. A. F. Service Police Don New Insignia

Designed for quick and easy identification is the new addition to the uniform of the Royal Canadian Air Force Service Police. The new insignia which will be seen in cities and towns across Canada within the next two weeks is smart and eye-catching.

It will consist of additions to the regular air force uniform. Male Service Police on city and train patrols will wear scarlet hat bands, bearing the letters "S.P." at the centre front, on round flat hats, such as the permanent force wore in peacetime. They will also wear scarlet arm bands embroidered with "RCAF Police" and white leather holsters containing a service revolver will also be innovations. A white lanyard worn around the neck and attached to the butt of the revolver, will complete these additions.

Women's Division Service Police are to be outfitted with ambrosia, similar scarlet hat bands to be worn on their regulation hats, and a white lanyard over the left shoulder. Both men and women S.P.'s will wear white gloves for special parades and duties. This completes the new uniform of all Command Pool Service Police, whose duty takes them outside of Air Force Stations on town and train patrols, etc.
