BRITAIN TO HAVE BIGGEST AIRSHIP

LONDON, Jan. 27—Great Britain's naval airship No. 1, which has been under construction more than twelve months at Barrow-in-Furness, is nearing completion. The building of this Dreadnought of the air has been marked by the greatest secrecy. None except the naval officers directing the work is allowed to approach the enormous shed in which it is being constructed. Its length is 510 feet, diameter 48 feet. It will therefore be larger than the gigantic Zeppelin. It is expected her eight cylinder motors and three specially constructed propellers will drive her through the air at fifty miles an hour.

CAPE-TO-CAIRO CONTEST IS THE LATEST

OTTAWA EXPLORER HELD A CAPTIVE?

NEW YORK, Jan. 26—A special to the Times from Ottawa says that G. F. Caldwell, the Ottawa explorer, who started from here on a mission for the Canadian government in 1906, and who has been missing three years, is held captive by the semi-savages of the Far North, is the belief of the Eskimos of the Hudson Bay region, according to a statement made here by Harry Ford, who is employed as government interpreter among the Eskimos. Mr. Ford says that before leaving for civilization he talked with some wandering Eskimo hunters who told him a weird tale of a Canadian white man. They said that far to the north there was a tribe of Eskimos who lived by themselves and who, unlike the ordinary Eskimos, were of a savage disposition. Members of this tribe had told them that they had taken this white man, whom they regarded as dangerous, and his two Eskimo companions into captivity.
