Will Have Horse Races and all Specialties.

The Downpour Yesterday Dashed the Hopes of Thousands—Promise of Fine Day's Sport This Afternoon.

Hundreds of disappointed visitors stood during the afternoon yesterday in the stores of the city, remained in their boarding places, or when the downpour of rain abated somewhat returned to their homes in the country without having visited the Exhibition of 1903.

In the forenoon the streets were crowded with spectators and everything gave promise for a much larger attendance than on Wednesday. The day was fine in the early part and everyone looked forward with pleasure to an afternoon at the Fair.

But hopes were to be dashed. At twelve the sky was overcast and before one the streets were flooded, the sidewalks were almost deserted and everyone was downcast. Till six the rain continued heavily and during the latter part of the evening it still appeared quite threatening.

At the Exhibition the main building was filled during the entire afternoon, about fifteen hundred having entered the grounds before the rain, those inside when the rain began being compelled to remain. Races were of course postponed and all work of judging etc. outside was suspended.

Interesting lectures were given on cattle, horses, etc., by several of the judges from the other provinces and everything possible done to make the afternoon interesting and instructive.

To-day the promise is for fine weather and if so a good day's sport should be on o'clock sharp. All the specialties will be given in front of the Grand Stand and one, two if possible, ascensions will be made by the balloon. With a favorable day there should be a big attendance from town and country.

NOTES.

J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove scored a distinct success in the two year old stallion class. Mr. Callbeck's Knight of Ardgowan stallion in competition with the two year olds won the first place in the class. He has also twenty Yorkshire pigs on exhibition but this class has not yet been judged. In this connection it is interesting to note that a boar bred by Mr. Callbeck took first prize at the Halifax Exhibition and was pronounced by judges to be the best ever shown in Nova Scotia.

Prominent among the pig exhibits is that shown by the Hermanville Farm Company of their famous Tamworths. One sow in particular is a remarkable animal and has turned into her owners \$900 worth in nine litters, each \$100. This great income earning animal is named Parkhill Mab 772. The company have also six more Tamworths on exhibition all of these being very creditable specimens of this famous bacon breed.

Lucky Jack, the fine Island bred draft stallion owned by Jabez Lea, Victoria regrettably only secured third place in his class. The reason was that several days ago the horse was unfortunately cut by his halter chain and has since been lame. It was only on earnest solicitation that Mr. Lea decided to put him in competition. In the past Lucky Jack has won four first prizes.

THE TEACHERS CONVENTION

The Session Held Yesterday Forenoon.

Interesting Paper Read by Miss Fennessey—Animated Discussion on the Subject of Teachers Federations.

The Convention met in morning session at 9.20 o'clock p. m. the President in the chair.

Miss Alice Fennessey read a carefully prepared paper on "Some Defects in our Schools." The distractions to which city children especially are subject prevent as good results as could be desired. The writer questioned whether the schools were producing at the present time as moral, manly and truthful as in the past. If not where does the fault lie? Not with the teacher. The teacher is conscientious in his work, overworked, and underpaid. The pupil as a result of the lack of home discipline, was not diligent in the studies. Not but what the parent would like to see the child industrious and educated but now it is the child who rules the home and not the parent. The fault of the present child life is the desire for something sensational, flashy and dislike to make any honest strenuous efforts. To remedy this there should be a united effort on the part of teacher and parent. An incultation of the importance of work and the beneficial effects that will always follow honest effort. The paper though brief was full of healthful thoughts and suggestive remedies for the evils complained of.

An interesting discussion followed the reading of the paper, partaken in by R. H. Campbell, Mr. Doyle, J. McSwain, Inspector Carter of St. John N. S. The thanks of the Convention was tendered Miss Fennessey for her excellent paper.

A very animated discussion was held on the subject of "Teachers' Federation." The following teachers took part: P. M. Grant, J. D. Seaman, Jas. Landriant, John McSwain, Mr. Doyle, J. A. Ready, R. H. Campbell, Timothy McDonald. On motion it was resolved that the teachers form a Teachers' Federation.

The following committee was appointed to prepare a constitution and Bye-Laws for the said Federation. J. D. Seaman, R. H. Campbell, W. D. McIntyre, P. M. Grant, Jas. Landriant.

Mr. Ballingall maker of the Map of Prince Edward Island introduced to the notice of the teachers his map, offering some prizes for maps of P. E. Island, open to competition for schools using Ballingall's map. Meeting adjourned.
