HUSBAND AND WIFE KILLED

TORONTO, Sept. 26.—At the suggestion of neighbors detectives last night broke into the residence of Harry Staples in the northwest part of the city and found the bodies of both Staples and his wife Rachael, lying on the floor with their throats cut. The man is believed to have murdered his wife and then committed suicide.

Rutledge To Be Hanged January 11

RED DEER, Sept. 24.—John Rutledge, the Innisfail farmer charged with murder, following the death of his wife and five children in a fire which destroyed their home near Innisfail on June 15 of this year, was today found guilty of murder. He was sentenced by Mr. Justice J. D. Hyndman to be hanged on January 11, 1922. The jury was out less than half an hour.

The victims of the murder were Mrs. Ethel Rutledge, and the five children, Ernest, Mary, Ivy and Florence and a baby.

Rutledge appeared in the Supreme Court without counsel. Mr. Justice Hyndman directed that H. H. Russell, Innisfail, who was present in the court should defend him.

When asked to plead, Rutledge stated that in a fit of temporary insanity he had assisted his wife to make preparations for setting the house on fire, but he was not guilty of the murder. This was taken by the judge as a plea of not guilty.

When neighbors and police officials searched the ruins of the Rutledge home after the conflagration they found the charred bodies of Mrs. Rutledge and her five children and Rutledge himself badly burned but alive. The story that Rutledge told did not satisfy the authorities and an investigation was started, with the result that Rutledge was arrested and charged with murder. A statement by his sister-in-law led to Rutledge's arrest. In her statement, the girl claimed that she was the mother of a child of which Rutledge was the father. Quarrels between Mrs. Rutledge and the accused followed and the result was the murder and suicide pact was formed.

The five children were clubbed into unconsciousness by Rutledge, who later set fire to the house.

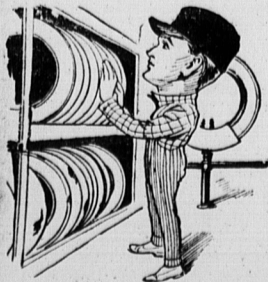

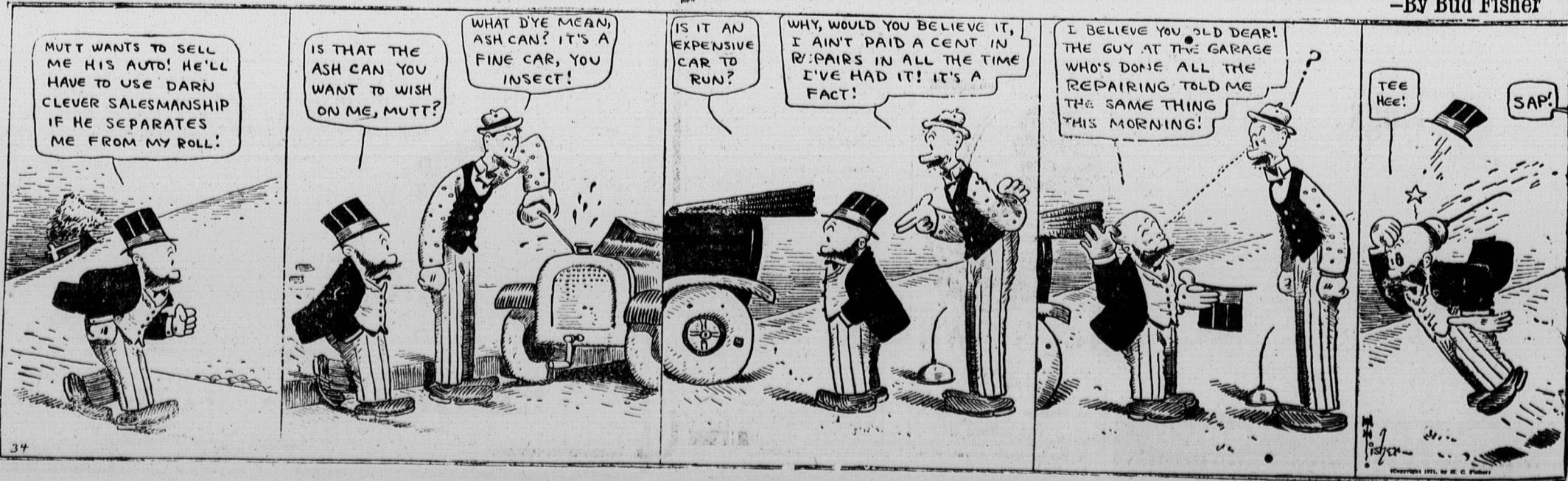


Making Good Ones From Bad Ones
