Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon acquisition of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reclamation in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivat on under certain conditions.

PRINCE COUNTY FEDERL NOMINATION

Of Six Applicants for the Honour Captain Joseph Read Survives the Ballot as the Choice of the Convention.

As elections are not won by prayer, candidates for political honours are not always conducted on prayer meeting lines. This was the opinion of those who attended the Prince County Liberal Convention in Summerside yesterday.

There was a large attendance, the different polls being represented. Dr. Jardine, President of the East Prince Liberal Association, occupied the chair, and Mr. R. H. Rogers acted as Secretary. The forenoon session was occupied in organization and a resolution of sympathy to the family of the late Mr. John Richards was unanimously adopted after which the delegates retired for dinner.

The trouble began at 1.30 when nominations were in order. As only one candidate was wanted and there were six who wanted it, there was naturally a good deal of scuffling at the beginning of the race for the coveted position.

PRINCE COUNTY FEDERL NOMINATION

Matters were slightly modified at an early stage by the withdrawal from the contest of Messrs A. E. McLean and J. J. McNally. Then there were three and the first ballot was cast. It resulted as follows: Capt. Joseph Read, 111; Mr. A. C. Samuels, 80; Mr. Benjamin Gallant, 34. This eliminated Mr. Gallant and then there were two. The next ballot resulted as follows: Captain Read, 111; Saunders, 80; and then there was one, and that one was Captain Joseph Read. On motion of Mr. Saunders, seconded by Mr. Gallant the nomination was formally declared unanimous, but informally and exteriorly, there were many evidences that there were two camps and that "East was East and West was West and never the twain would meet." The disappointed, however, swallowed their disappointment temporarily and as the decision of the Convention is probably final Capt. Read will, when the election comes off, face the electorate.
