that our Sunday School enrollment is decreasing and there is a general letting down of those standards and a slackening of the efforts which have in the past given tone to spiritual and national life. It is estimated in the United States that the 29 million attend Sunday School, there are as many more who remain untaught. In Canada the last available figures show a decrease in Sunday School enrollment greater than the decrease in public school population warrants, and thousands of youth are growing up in ignorance of Christian teaching. There is little use of our country spending both blood and treasure in defending our Christian faith and freedom abroad if we allow it to perish at home. We claim to be fighting for democracy but democracy is something more than a system of government and the foundations of real democracy are moral and spiritual. Such a situation cannot be faced by the churches working independently. It is an all-out effort. We must have the spirit of a Marshal Puch who declared, "My right is falling back; my left is hard pressed. With the centre I shall attack."

In view of this more than 40 denominations working under the auspices of the International Council of Religious Christian Education Advance. This is a concerted movement of Protestant educational forces wherein they reaffirm their conviction that through Christian teaching the life-changing power of God may be released in individual lives in homes and in communities.

PURITY

 Any girl's greatest asset is her modesty and good morals. She will be sorry for an act in the past. She will thank herself many times, when later in life she has children, who, because of her own moral purity, are good healthy children.
 A girl's popularity varies with her moral and pure actions.
 Many times, immoral actions of youth are the direct result of drinking, or smoking. Everywhere we

turn, we see examples of what drink has done to morals. A girl should be taught to remember that—"The degree of admiration a man entertains for modesty and reserve, denotes his worth as a friend or companion."

DIRECTOR OF TEMPERANCE EDUCATION

The Government of Manitoba has done a fine thing when they appointed Mr. W. D. Bayley, Director of Temperance Education for their schools and directions went out what a typical day's work was expected to be. "The Director is to lecture to ALL the children in the schools, gathered in four groups, primary, intermediate, junior high and senior high. In the smaller centres all the children come together at once in some hall or church and the main points of the whole course are covered. When the primary lesson has been taught, the little ones are dismissed, and so on. Thus the older people either hear for the first time, or get a review of the material which the young pupils should know."

WAVE OF TEMPERANCE

MONTREAL, Jan. 20 (CP)—Airpower is making Russia one of Canada's nearest neighbors, Prime Minister Mackenzie King said tonight, and "as we become neighbors we desire more than ever to become also the most helpful of friends."
 Mr. King introduced Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the United States President, who spoke at a meeting in support of the Aid-to-Russia Campaign.

Civilian Health Problems Emphasized At Ottawa Meeting

OTTAWA, Jan. 20 (CP)—The importance of maintaining the health of the civilian population as well as that of the armed forces was stressed today at a meeting of some 50 medical men, from all parts of Canada, representing the Canadian Medical Procurement and assign-

ment board and its advisory committee. "Sitting in with the doctors for the opening of the conference were Defence Minister Ralston—later injured in an automobile accident—Air Minister Power, Labor Minister Mitchell and Pensions Minister MacKenzie, all of them spoke briefly.
 "The armed services just can't take everything," said Col. Ralston. "We must remember and take care of the civilian population. It is important that we have a healthy nation. In your work you will surmount the whole health phase of national life."
 The procurement and assignment board's function is to arrange the selection of medical men for the armed forces so as to interfere as little as possible with civilian medical services and to make sure that all services are available where they

are needed either for service personnel or for civilians.
 Mr. Mitchell said there are shortages everywhere and everything has to be stretched, but that if any sacrifice is to be made it should be by those who are not confronted with death seven days a week.
