PROHIBITION AT THE ANTI-PODES.

Shakespeare has exclaimed, "How far the little candle throws its beam! So shines a good deed in a naughty world." Apropos of this we have at hand the No License News Bulletin of Invercargill, Dominion of New Zealand, dated May 1908—published on the other side of the world and actually quoting "Brother David Small and Brother S. F. Hodgson," with an extract also from an editorial in the Charlotetown Guardian. All this, of course in the furtherance of temperance reform in that distant community.

New Zealand is noted for the bold and most advanced legislation in many lines that is found in the world. They have government ownership of railways, telegraphs and telephones and women suffrage among other things. But in one matter at least little Prince Edward Island is ahead of the far off New Dominion of the antipodes, the prohibition of liquor traffic and this fact has attracted the attention of many and the admiration of not a few, and they will not rest until the liquor traffic is fully de-legalised there as here.

Invercargill, is a town nearly the size of Charlottetown, and they have already adopted the plan of "No License" there. We have before us a circular signed by the Mayor and one hundred business men and firms of that town, including the editors of two daily papers and one weekly, testifying that the closing of the bars has had no detrimental effect on the value of property, that public order is excellent, that the moral tone of the town has been improved and they recommend other towns to adopt the same plan.

We are pleased to be able to report to the good people of Invercargill that prohibition in Charlottetown is still doing the same good work as it was when we wrote the article which has been quoted there; that it stands higher than ever in the estimation of our people; that the favorable results down to date have exceeded even the expectations of its promoters in this city, and that the liquor traffic was never so utterly discredited here as it is today. While in outlying portions of the Province the law has not been so thoroughly enforced as it is here, it has done good work and has today at its back the great majority of the people of the Province. We shall be pleased to hear from New Zealand again as to the progress of the good work there.

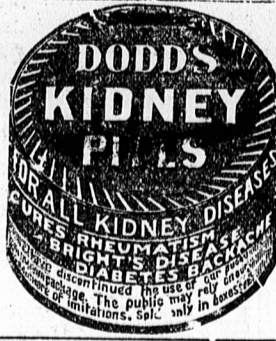
REVERENCE AND RESPECT.

No one doubts the deep and abiding loyalty of the people of Prince Edward Island. And yet if one were to judge by the conduct of many when the National Anthem is played or sung, whether at the close of a church service or at the end of a play or entertainment, a question as to their reverence and respect for King and flag might be raised. We are satisfied that this arises from mere thoughtlessness or haste to get away.

We are nearing the annual celebration of Dominion Day when patriotic matters come to the front. Would it not be well to begin the new Canadian year by paying loyal observance to what are our obvious duties in these matters? There are even high concerns than loyalty to the Sovereign to be considered. The National Anthem is an invocation to God for His blessing on our beloved Sovereign. It is fitting that when it is sung or played all citizens should stand uncovered reverently till it is completed. Children look at their elders and superiors in these matters and are quick to follow the example set. For this reason also due observance should be paid to the National Anthem.

While we are on the subject there is another point closely related that may be touched upon. When at the close of a memorial service the Dear March is played, it should be understood to be a part of the service which is not completed till the march is played through to the end. To rush out of the church before the end of the service of the day show want of reverence for the peace and for the service and is also an undignified proceeding not quite consistent with proper self-respect. A little thought should prevent the recurrence of an obvious, and two frequent occurrence of this sort.

The Pall Mall Gazette, viewing Canada from across the Atlantic, concludes that the Liberal Government in this country is doomed to early defeat. This is rather hasty judgment, based upon the Ontario and Quebec elections apparently. In Great Britain, the by-elections have been going against the Government there, and they no doubt afford a strong indication of the trend of popular feeling. Our provincial elections do not afford the same sort of index. The fields of provincial and federal Government and legislation here are separate. It is an easy thing to overturn a Government in the British Isles compared with what it is in federal Canada. There frequent changes are the rule. Here we frequently keep our Governments too long. In the federal by-elections since 1903 some 28 Liberals to 7 Conservatives have been returned.

Over in New Brunswick where the Transcontinental Railway in progressing the sale of liquor to workmen in the works is not permitted. One Theriault was the other day convicted in seven cases and fined in each case \$50 and costs, the fines amounting to \$350. In default of payment he offender must serve 21 months in all. His stock of liquors was seized and ordered to be destroyed. This will doubtless have a wholesome effect.

The proposed increase in rates to the older members of the Independent Order of Foresters as decided upon by the Supreme Court in Toronto is not yet very well understood by the members generally, owing conflicting and somewhat confused statements in the newspapers. No time should be lost by the returning delegates in making the members of the Order fully and officially acquainted with the facts as to how each one of the older members will be affected. As we understand it the new rates take effect from 1st October next.

On July 1st, 1908.

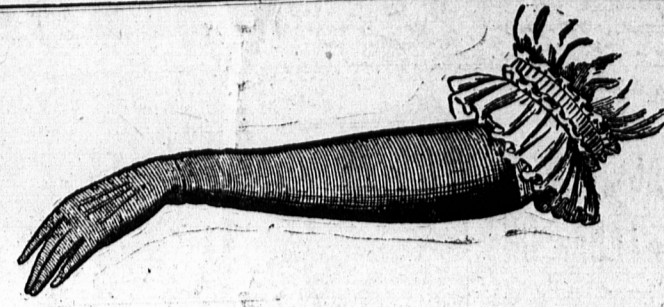

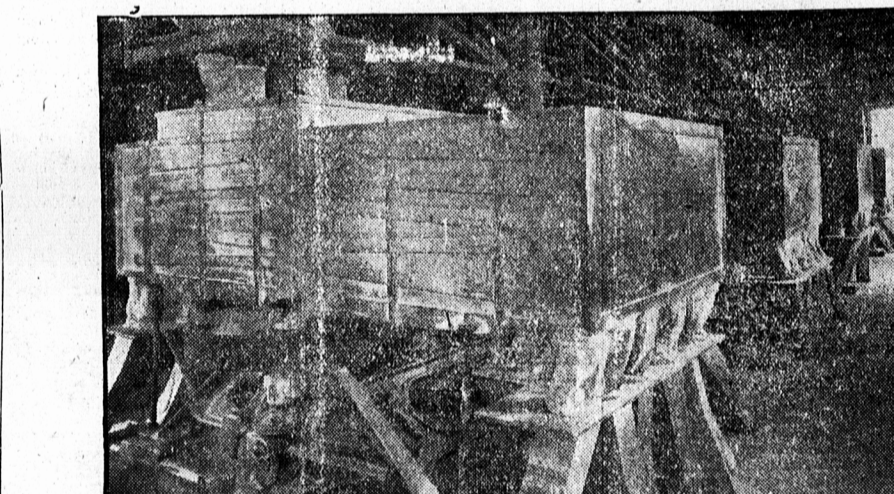
