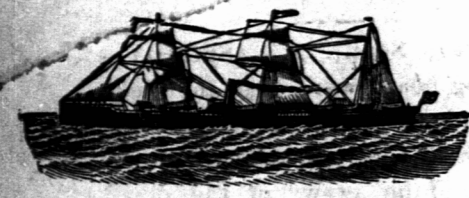

THE BRIDGE SITE.

Since the brief reference to this subject in our Saturday's issue, we learn that at the recent meeting at Moncton of the Local Government delegation with Sir Louis Davies and Hon. A. G. Blair the site for the Hillsborough Bridge was practically agreed upon. The location so far made is from Mutch's Point on the Southport side to Kensington Range on this side. It will be seen at a glance that this location must be disappointing both to the people of Charlottetown and those of Southport.

The reasons assigned are engineering reasons in the first place, it being alleged that a bridge can be built from Mutch's Point at less cost than directly in front of the city, owing to the less width of the deep water channel and the less depth of water and of mud in that locality. It is also put forward in excuse for this site that the bridge will there be out of the way of shipping in the harbor, the free movement of which might be interfered with if the bridge were located over the route of the present ferry, or even from Southport to the Railway Wharf.

We take it that the decision reached is not like the laws of the Medes and Persians, irrevocable. And before it becomes so, before a work which is to endure for generations is constructed or entered upon, the people on whose behalf it is to be built are entitled to know that the site is the best available one. We have not heard from any one whose opinion can carry weight that it is impossible to build a railway and general traffic bridge direct from Charlottetown to Southport. It is, we understand a mere matter of cost. And unless the difference in cost can be shown to be great,—of which so far we are not satisfied—the public convenience must be considered as a more than sufficient offset.

The proposed site, if adopted will be found not only disappointing but inconvenient. As far as foot passengers and wagon traffic are concerned it must tend to reduce the use of the bridge far below what it would be if the bridge were placed opposite the city front. The Provincial Government has reserved the power to collect tolls on the bridge, and any revenue to be derived from that source must be lessened by locating the bridge so far outside the city.

We take it that those in authority desire to locate the bridge where it will give the best accommodation consistent with reasonable cost. We therefore state the matter as it is in order that our citizens generally, or the City Council as their corporate representatives, or the Board of Trade on behalf of our commercial and business interests, may at once make such representations as the case may call for.

And now the much-decried Doukhobors in the Northwest are establishing a newspaper of their own. Ignorant, worthless people have not much use for newspapers. The "Douks" must be of some account or they would not set up a printing press.

The Toronto Globe points out that the hotel accommodation at the Canadian summer resorts has this year been quite inadequate. The Globe thinks that even Toronto, which is usually thought to be sufficiently sup-

plied with hotels, is still in need of another and more luxurious one than at present exists in that city. It points out that the Americans are very luxurious travellers and at present make their stay in Toronto as brief as possible because Montreal and Quebec have more sumptuous hotels. There is much of the Globe's article which would better fit the latitude of Charlottetown.

The World tells that this is Vancouver's growing time. "New buildings, some of them of a truly palatial character, are being erected in every direction. In the centre, or inside portion of the city there are in process of erection many business blocks which would do credit to either Montreal, Toronto, or even many of the leading American cities. These are being built by parties who are confident that there is a great future ahead of Vancouver, otherwise their investments would be placed elsewhere. In almost every instance the blocks, or stores, are let before their erection had ever been begun. The same remarks apply to many of the new residences in all sections of the city."
