Dear Brother:—Just a line to let you know I am able to creep around, just the same as ever. I had a pretty narrow escape. A week ago we were shelling out of camp about two in the morning, and I tell you it was pretty hot for us for a while. We lost a few men. A wishbone hit alongside of my wagon and gave me a bad fright but did not hurt me any. One of my heel chains was cut off with a piece of shell, but its all over now and I hope it won't happen again. Well I haven't much news this time as I wrote home a short while ago. The weather is pretty good here and the crops look fine around the country and the grass is up about six inches. I suppose it is pretty cold and wet and lots of mud down home by this time. Well, I am writing this sitting down by a big tree on a pile of horse blankets. Some writing desk. I am waiting for that writing paper I sent for and pipe, if I get it in 1923 I don't care, but any later than that won't do. Well I must close, with love to all. From your loving brother JOE.

RUSSIA MAKE VIGOROUS PROTEST

LONDON, May 22.—The Russian Commissioner for Foreign Affairs, it was made known today, sent the following wireless message on April 12th to the German Foreign Office:

"In the Turkish advance on the Caucasus, the peaceful population, including men, women and children, is being cut down by the thousands. The treaty we were forced to sign at Brest-Litovsk provided that the population at Ardahan, Kars and Batum should have full freedom and the right to control their destiny in their own way. The events in these regions show that the policy of extermination which has been followed for the past ten years is still being pursued. Responsibility for atrocities among the Armenian people in the region at present occupied by Turkey devolves upon the German Government, whose direct assistance make it possible for Turkey to exercise its will in these regions.

"The People's Commission for Foreign Affairs vigorously protests against the betrayal of the right of the populations of Ardahan, Kars and Batum to dispose of themselves. The Commissioner insists upon the necessity of speedy and decisive intervention on the part of Germany in the Caucasus to prevent the continuance of the massacre and extermination of the peaceful population, which is taking place at Ardahan."

RUSSIANS FLOCK TO SEE BRITISH TARS FROM HELSINGFORS

PETROGRAD, May 22.—The other evening the Russian public passing along the Neva quay in front of the British Embassy were attracted by the sight of a party of British sailors preparing to escort several cartloads of baggage and naval stores to the Nicholas railway station. These were the bluejackets, about 30 in number, who were obliged to destroy their submarines last week in Helsingfors to save them from Germany. They had loaded rifles slung on the shoulders or laid on their knees as they sat upon cases of Australian bully beef and biscuits ready against any hooligan attempt at expropriation. They had a free and easy manner about them and even a jaunty air, which seemed to defy the squalor of their Russian surroundings which was quite out of keeping with the melancholy aspect of Petrograd and its dirty unkempt inhabitants. They had made good use of the 24 hours at the comfortable quarters of the embassy mansion to bathe and rig themselves out afresh. They turned out as spick and span as on parade. The spotless blue of their dress and the shape of their shoes, the only polished footwear seen here of soldier or sailor for many a long day, presented a glaring contrast to the greyness and untidiness of the Russian republic, who stopped to look on in gaping astonishment.

Half-starved natives cast longing eyes at the abundance of toothsome rations these Jack Tars were guarding so jealously, and well it was that they took the precaution, for sudden hunger raids by scavengers are now almost a daily occurrence. This departure of the British naval contingent from the Baltic, which is now completely under the control of the Germans, marks the latest scene of Britain's active help to defeating Russia as an ally in the war. Amongst the characteristics of the present extraordinary period of Russian history are strange exaggerations and contradictions which distort and render suspicious most of the official as well as private news. It is part of the general chaos now affecting all things Russian. The destruction of the British submarines at Helsingfors, together with one or two barges containing a few hundred mines and torpedoes, war heads which were sunk in seventeen fathoms of water, was actually denied in print by one Russian naval authority connected with the Baltic fleet after he had heard that the fleet was on the spot and had reported the incident an accomplished fact. Really it was only too evident to the people of Helsingfors, who were shocked at the tremendous noise and vibration of their houses, that they thought it must be an earthquake.

The submarines were piloted out by an ice-breaker five miles beyond the fortress of Sveaborg, which guards the entrance to Helsingfors harbor. Charges were then fitted with time fuses and the men withdrew and stood about a mile off on the ice until every vestige of the inflated boats had disappeared in flames and columns of smoke which accompanied the explosions. So violent were the reports that they induced the men in charge of a not far distant light house to think the Germans had arrived on the scene. One of the most ridiculous tidbits published here in connection with the affair was the story of the heroic suicide of one of their officers who was so much affected by the loss of his boat that he sang "Rule Britannia" and then shot himself.

CHINESE COOLIE LABOR TO RELIEVE THE SHORTAGE

OTTAWA, May 22.—There was tabled in parliament today a return, consisting of 200 typewritten pages of correspondence between Sir Robert Borden, Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration and Hon. T. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture, and various people relating to the movement of bringing Chinese coolie labor into Canada to relieve the labor shortage and to increase production.

Generally speaking, the proposal received a considerable amount of support from a limited section of the agricultural interests of the Province of Saskatchewan, the fruit growing industry of British Columbia, and other bodies. The strongest opposition came from organized labor throughout the Dominion. One of the first letters in the file was from Mr. Mark Workman, President of the Dominion Steel Corporation, who in a letter to the Prime Minister as far back as August, 1917, referred to "the possibility of providing additional labor for the operations in Cape Breton through the expedient of importing Chinese workers."

Sir Robert Borden in reply suggested that the President of the Dominion Steel Corporation should make formal application, setting forth the needs of the operation in detail, at a later date. He stated that it would be impossible to deal with the matter during the session of parliament in progress.

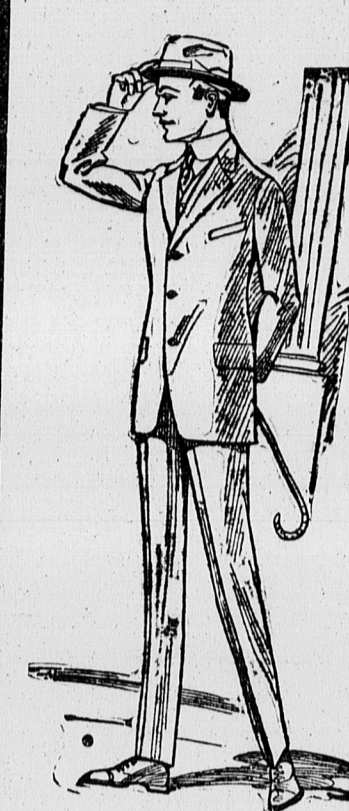
Shook the City

For the purpose of destroying the submarines, large quantities of exploded by means of fuses. The series of explosions which followed shook the entire city of Helsingfors, and the crash of the detonations was heard for miles around. At the same time the large stock of torpedoes and spare parts on hand was also blown up. After an inspection had shown that the work had been effectively done the British crews left the city and retired northward across Finland into Russia, reporting on duty a fortnight later at a submarine base in England.

The property value of the craft and the material destroyed reached a total of £500,000.
