Impressive Service at St. James Church

A GEOD AND UPRIGHT MAN ELOGISED

The funeral service of the late Archibald Kennedy was held in St. James church yesterday afternoon at three o'clock. The service was an impressive one. The deep tones of the organ and the sombre draping of the church added to its solemnity. Previous to the service Adell Gordon, little daughter of Daniel Gordon, and John Fullerton, son of Rev. T. F. Fullerton, laid two beautiful floral tributes on the casket, in behalf of St. James Sunday School.

The following is the order of the service: Hymn—Peace, Perfect Peace. Psalm 89—Rev. Donald McNeill. Hymn—Asleep in Jesus. I Cor. XV—Rev. Mr. Spencer. Hymn—Take Comfort Christians. Sermon—Rev. Mr. Fullerton. The text selected was particularly fitting, viz: The memory of the just is blessed.

All who knew the late Mr. Kennedy will ever remember him as an honorable, upright citizen of stainless character and without an enemy. His generous support of every good cause has rendered his memory indeed blessed.

The remains will be conveyed by a special train this morning to Miscouche, the funeral leaving the house at 8:45 a. m. and the train at 9 a. m. sharp. All wishing to attend will be able to return to town at an early hour.

COLONEL LYNCH IS SENTENCED TO DEATH FOR HIGH TREASON

His Counsel's Plea that He Believed Himself a Naturalized Burgher—Crown Counsel Says this Was a Flimsy Pretext—The Verdict and Sentence—Fatal Panic in a New York Cigar Factory.

LYNCH'S COUNSEL'S PLEA.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—(Special)—At Col. Lynch's trial the counsel for the defence contended that his naturalization was not prompted by treasonable intent but solely by the advantages he would secure from the journalistic standpoint. Subsequently the defendant actively supported the Boer cause in the belief that he was a legally naturalized burgher.

WHAT CROWN COUNSEL ARGUED.

The Crown counsel declared that Lynch joined the Boer army as a discontented Irishman and his alleged naturalization was only a flimsy pretext.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE'S CHARGE.

The Chief Justice declared that naturalization in war time afforded no excuse and that there was abundant evidence of

THE JURY FIND LYNCH GUILTY.

The Jury returned a verdict of "guilty" on all of four counts.

HE HAS NOTHING TO SAY.

To the usual question whether he had anything to say why sentence of death should not be passed upon him, Lynch replied, "Thank you. I will say nothing."

SENTENCE OF DEATH PRONOUNCED.

The sentence of death was then pronounced on each of the four counts of the indictment.
