AN INDICTMENT AGAINST THE "GO PREACHERS."

There have been for some time in Prince Edward Island a number of professed religious teachers variously known as "Go Preachers," "No Sect," and "No Church." Several correspondents have written us denouncing their delusive teachings and practices. The last issue of The Theologue, published by the students of the Presbyterian College Halifax calls further attention to the subject. The Theologue states it has received sworn declarations from Ipswich, England, attested by twelve overseers of the poor, and among other documents a warning signed by forty overseers of the poor, exposing

the immoral teachings and practices of these itinerants. It adds: "We call attention to this here because these people driven out of England, are scouring the Maritime Provinces, and it is the duty of every man who cares one whit for the body or soul of another to put the cold convincing logic of facts before the people, that the sufferings worse than death of unsuspecting converts may not be repeated here."

This is strong language, but not too strong in face of the documents and allegations which the Theologue prints.

THE BAD MAN IN POLITICAL AFFAIRS.

No reader of the more or less reliable and veracious political journals of Canada can have failed to notice the large place that the bad man holds in public affairs and press discussions. When we speak of bad men we do not mean that they are really immoral, dishonest or corrupt. We merely mean that they are adjudged to be one or other of all these by their political opponents and for party purposes. This sort of bad man gets much free and unflattering notice at political meetings during elections and afterward in Parliament, when it sits, and all the time in the political papers. He must needs be attacked and he must needs be defended, and the attack and defence occupy the time of many able and versatile writers to such an extent that the good man in public life, of whom we trust there are some few survivors, receives but scant notice.

After all, are not wicked people much more interesting than the good? Sir John Macdonald was pre-eminently the bad man of his time to all the excellent Liberal party journals, and at the same time, was a most interesting figure and the Grand Old Man in all the veracious organs of Conservatism. At the last federal election much was heard of the bad men on both sides. Foster, Fowler, Crockett and Ames, were by merit raised to that bad eminence on one side and Sir Frederick Borden, Emerson, Pugsley and Brodeur on the other. They were all re-elected except Mr. Fowler and in most cases by increased majorities, whether from admiration on the part of the people for their badness, or more probably because the people did not believe they were morally so black as they were painted, or it may be because of the very virulence of the attacks upon them served to win them sympathy. And so we have the bad man in Parliament and the excellent party journals go on from day to day alternately black-washing and whitewashing them. They are always in the public eye, while the

honest good men is forgotten. The bad man after an election does not seem quite so bad as before, whether elected or defeated. If elected, that counts for much in the general estimation. There is a wide belief in electoral absolutism. The bad man "points with pride" to his majority. He may have bought it, or have been floated in upon a sea of beer, but whether he has been washed in or washed out he feels cleaner than he was. Like Juno's virtue, which a dip or two in some blest fountain made as new.

The electors are prone also to forgive the bad man whom they have voted out. They did not really want to hurt him, are half sorry they hit him, and are quite ready to promise their support for next time. Anyway, what would politics be without a little alleged crookedness, or seeming scandal now and then? What would hold the interest in Parliament for even three months, or what would fill the excellent party journals and fill their columns if we had not the bad men to attack and defend? We could not get along without our bad men. They help to make the game of politics interesting, and they know how to play it. And this also they know, that in politics it is better to be vigorously assailed than not to be mentioned. TERRIBLE MASSACRE REPORTED

BEIRUT, May 12.—The recent rioting in the vicinity of Marash has laid waste the entire district. Marash, it seems, was spared, for only a few persons were killed, but within sixty miles to the southwest, 16 villages with a population of eight thousand souls were practically wiped out. The only survivors are boys under ten and old women. The girls were carried away and the men killed. Telegraphic reports declare the hungry and naked to number 14,000. Immediate relief is required. The interior districts are still far from settled and from all directions the most heartrending accounts and appeals are being received here.

TWENTY MEN DROWNED.

PITTSBURGH, May 12.—Twenty persons are missing—all being drowned when a gasoline launch sank in the Ohio river. Of thirty occupants of the boat only ten escaped. The victims were employees of the Steel Company. They worked over time and left the works to cross the river in a launch. The launch was intended for not over 20 persons, but all the men crowded in. There was no explanation and no leak. The boat simply sank beneath the weight it had been bearing and went to the bottom. The vortex created took many of the men down with it. Others attempted to swim ashore, but were chilled by the cold water, and became exhausted.
