Many of the farmers of this Province who have met Professor Melville Cummings formerly principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, will be interested to know that he has been appointed by the Governor in Council to be Secretary of Agriculture for Nova Scotia, in place of B. W. Chipman, deceased; and that Frederick A. Fuller, of Truro is to be Superintendent of Agricultural Societies; and Stanley Logan, of Amherst Point, the well known breeder of Holstein cattle and Shropshire sheep, to be Superintendent of the Agricultural College farm, at Truro.

The steamer Batrios, which was wrecked off Cranberry Head, N. S., last fall was sold Saturday to J. C. Lambert. There were only a few tenders received, which were forwarded to the underwriters in London. The nature of these tenders were not satisfactory and they decided to sell the steamer as she now lies. The Batrios was commanded by Capt. Peters of Georgetown and was one of the last vessels leaving this port last fall. She had much difficulty in getting clear of the ice outside and not long afterwards was wrecked. She is now to be broken up.

On Monday evening, May 6th, the members of St. Andrew's Division, Hampton, gave a special entertainment and supper in behalf of their friends, Bros. Warren Villet and Frank Flett on the eve of their departure for the West. J. P. After a vote of thanks was tendered the ladies for their great kindness in preparing supper, division then adjourned in L. P. and P.

D. W. B. Reid of Reid & Archibald, Halifax, arrived in the city yesterday to supervise the construction of the new railway pier, the contract for which was awarded to that firm last week. The sum involved is in the vicinity of \$150,000. The work consists of deepening for foundation, widening the present wharf structure to one hundred and twenty-six feet and extending the whole sixty-eight and a half feet further out into the stream. The extension will be made at the west side and across the head of the wharf. It is to be built of crib work faced with reinforced concrete. Nearly one hundred tons of steel will be used in strengthening the concrete. The dredging for the foundation will amount to some thirty thousand cubic yards. It is intended that the work shall be commenced at once and will be pressed forward with all the energy of this well known contracting firm until its completion next year. Mr. Reid will remain in the city during the open season and have charge of the work. He is registered at the Queen.

Hon. Peter and Mrs. McNutt and the Misses McNutt have left the City to spend the summer at their home in Malpeque.

Two round trips on the East River today and two round trips on the West River tomorrow (Saturday) will be made by the S. F. City of London.

Miss Jessie Poole, daughter of W. S. Poole, Mechanical Superintendent of the Prince Edward Island Railway, left yesterday morning for Calgary.

The schooner Dictator, Capt. Bunnell left St. Pierre, Miquelon some time ago for Halifax and one untimely heavy ice near Sable Island, which detained her several days. She has proceeded to Montserrat where she is loading cargo of produce, lumber, etc for St. Pierre, Miquelon.

The salaries of the outside Customs Officials, an Ottawa despatch says, have been increased about ten and in some cases 15 per cent. The increase dates from 1st of April. This means a total increase of about \$300,000. The increases will apply to the officials of the port of Charlottetown in common with the rest of Canada.

Yesterday the S. S. City of London took a large cargo of freight on her first trip of the season to Halliday's China Point and Brush wharves. She encountered much ice en route and took fourteen hours to make the round trip which usually takes five hours. The return cargo consisted of 55 cases eggs and 30 casks.

A Halifax Despatch, dated yesterday, says:—"After six days and five nights adrift in a tiny craft in mid-ocean, and without food or water, David Steel of Boston and O. McPhee of Prince Edward Island, two of the crew of the American fishing schooner Mystery, were rescued from the jaws of death, by the Canadian Mexico liner Bernu, which arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Mexico. The Mystery left Boston yesterday to search for the four men who had not been heard of. Alex. Steel, one of the two men landed at Halifax is a brother of Captain Geo. Steel of the Mystery, and was to have been married today to a Cambridge girl. The two men still missing are Captain Publico of Nova Scotia, and J. Nanson of Prince Edward Island.
