NAPOLEON'S THREATENED INVASION RECALLED.

The fear of a German invasion of the British Isles serves to recall the very real danger from a long threatened attack by the great Napoleon a little more than a century ago. He had collected one hundred and fifty thousand chosen troops on the French shores of the Channel. He had a vast flotilla of flatbottomed vessels sufficient to transport them to the shores of England. For two years and a half he had practised them in embarkation and disembarkation, and had taught them how to manoeuvre, steer and work their guns under every condition of the changing sea. The spirit of his soldiers was excellent and they had full confidence in their great commander. They were constantly employed in exercises either by sea or land, in digging trenches, fortifying the shore, or beautifying their camp. We quote: "Special boats or barges were assigned to each battalion and company and every man down to the smallest drummer, knew his own craft and his place in it. As soon as the signal was given, the different arms—infantry, cavalry and artillery—were immediately in readiness and marched straight to the ships. At the sound of a warning gun all the officers dismounted and placed themselves at the head of their troops, a second gun ordered them to prepare for embarkation, a third was fired for the placing of non-commissioned officers, a fourth for the march. In this manner twenty-five thousand men could be embarked in ten minutes and a half. The army was full of enthusiasm; they thought the decisive moment had come at last, but a fifth report bade them leave the ships. In thirteen minutes they again stood on the shore in battle array." Those were anxious days in England in 1803-5 while Napoleon held his camp at Boulogne. His name was a terror to the world. The British supremacy of the sea was not yet established. That came with Nelson's great victory at Trafalgar on October, 1805.

THE CHANGED ATTITUDE TOWARDS FAMILY WORSHIP.

The newspapers tell that at the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church held in Denver not long since a resolution was offered the preamble to which began with the words: "Whereas family worship is a thing of the past," and going on to declare that Sunday schools should therefore receive more attention. There was prompt dissent from the proposed preamble, some commissioners wanting to know whether it is true that family worship had ceased from the land, and there was a prospect of discussion on the subject till the words were changed from "a thing of the past" to "greatly neglected." And yet it is true that a great and to many minds a regrettable change has come over the Christian world in regard to this matter of collective household worship. It would be a mistake, however, to attribute the change altogether to the decadence of the worshipping spirit. It is in part due to change in methods of living, the greater diversity of callings, the differing hours at which different members of the household go forth to their daily callings, and the consequent obstacles to assembling them all together in the morning or evening. P. H. Roy, manager of the Banque de St. Jean, Quebec, was the other day found guilty and sentenced to some years of imprisonment for making false returns to the Government. Incidentally it was made clear that had any attempt been made by the authorities at Ottawa to analyse the statements sent in the fraud would have been discovered. The same neglect was apparent in the cases of the Bank of Yarmouth, Banque de St. Hyacinthe, Ontario Bank and Sovereign Bank, all comparatively recent failures. By this neglect depositors and shareholders have suffered untold losses. What is the use of such Governmental supervision?

Family worship preceded many of the forms of religious activity which are widely prevalent today. The Sunday school, Bible Societies, foreign missions, the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, and a hundred other institutions, religious, moral or benevolent have come in since the days when the patriarchal family altar was first erected. And the liquor jug and decanter have also disappeared from millions of Christian homes whose ancestry worshipped morning and evening and stimulated between times. Polygamy and human slavery were in the early days thought to be not inconsistent with morning and evening worship. But doubtless some changes that have come over the world have been for the worse instead of the better. Still, we think despite the pessimistic notions which sometimes find expression in the preambles and resolutions offered at the meetings of Christian Assemblies, Synods and Conferences, there are more agencies for good, and a more diversified activity for the religious and moral betterment and uplifting of the world, and a brighter outlook for the future now than existed in any past age of human history.
