...LITTLE LAD DEAD.—The death occurred on Friday morning of Frank, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Lavers. The little fellow contracted a heavy cold that died after only a few days illness of congestion of the lungs. The funeral was held from Holy Trinity Church, Georgetown, Sunday afternoon at two o'clock and was very largely attended. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the community in the loss of this bright little boy.—G.

THE MARKETS

Wheat: On the Toronto market wheat is still lower selling at from 90 cents to 96 cents per bushel, London 75 cents, Woodstock 85 cents.

Oats: Old oats at Toronto are steady at 58 cents per bushel, New oats at 41, at Belleville 40 cents a bushel, at Coburg 35 cents, at Owen Sound 32 cents and at Stratford 35c.

Mill Feeds: Prices have again dropped. Bran at Toronto is bringing \$25. per ton, Shorts and Middlings \$28. At Montreal bran is bringing \$25.50. Flour: There is another drop of fifty cents in the price of flour. First patents at Toronto are bringing \$5.75, second patents \$5.25 and strong bakers \$5.05. Prices are about ten cents higher in Montreal.

Hay: The hay market is a little easier. The best of timothy at Toronto is bringing \$18 to \$22 per ton. Other grades \$16 to \$18. At Belleville new baled hay \$15.50, at Owen Sound \$18 at Woodstock \$14 and Montreal \$18.

Livestock: Grass cattle were plentiful on the market. The top prices for this week were \$7.85 per hundred pounds; a drop of 10c from last week and 75c from the week before.

Hogs: The price of hogs has advanced another 25c. Monday opened with a fair run and buyers insistent for supplies. Prices paid were from \$9.65 to \$10. per hundred pounds off cars. This compares with \$9.40 and \$9.75 of last week. At Montreal prices also advanced, selected stock selling at from \$7.60 to \$7.90 per hundred pounds. The Agricultural Gazette speaking of the hog situation on September 14th says: "the tone of the market is very firm at the recent advance and there was a further rise yesterday in the Toronto market of 25c. The demand for dressed hogs continues good with sales of abattoir fresh killed stock at \$13.75."

Horses: The horse market continues slow. Army horses are pouring into Toronto for the Imperial Government, but for commercial trade there is nothing doing. In the American markets there is quite a lot of activity, for the army the French are paying for light riders \$150, for light gunners from \$150 to \$160, and for heavy gunners \$180. The British are paying a little bit higher, particularly for the heavy gunners.

Sheep and Lambs: Lambs recovered the 25c per hundred pounds lost last week. The range paid for the bulk was \$8.25 to \$8.75 per hundred pounds. Large lots of lambs sold at the top price. Light ewes brought \$5.50 to \$6.50.

Butter: An active trade is doing in butter at Toronto this week. Prices have advanced somewhat. Creamery prints are bringing from 27c to 27½c per pound. At St Hyacinthe, Quebec, 250 packages sold at 27½c per pound, while at Cowansville butter brought 28½c per pound. At Montreal the market is improving, choicest creamery bringing 28½c to 29c.

Cheese: The cheese market continues to show improvement. The export demand seems to be improving somewhat. On Tuesday local Cheese Boards in Ontario sold at 14½c a lb. The tone of the market is firm.
