New Brunswick Titlists Beaten 7-1 By Locals

The Junior Royals' express, gathering speed and momentum as it rolls along the playoff trail, last night captured the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island junior hockey title when they defeated Chatham Juniors 7-1 in the second and deciding game of the total goal series.

Tied with five goals apiece as the teams lined up after the colorful opening ceremonies, Royals looked like anything but champions during the first period, a session in which they were outplayed by the visitors despite their gaining a one goal lead.

Smashing offensive thrusts that threatened to sweep the Chatham team before them took them past the last line of defense time after time. Skating both ways with equal effectiveness Royals slammed in three counters to take a three goal lead as Chatham accounted for their lone tally.

Despite the one-sided score the near capacity crowd of fans that witnessed the game saw two gamecocks of teams battle every inch of the way over an ice surface that was made sticky by the summer-like weather.

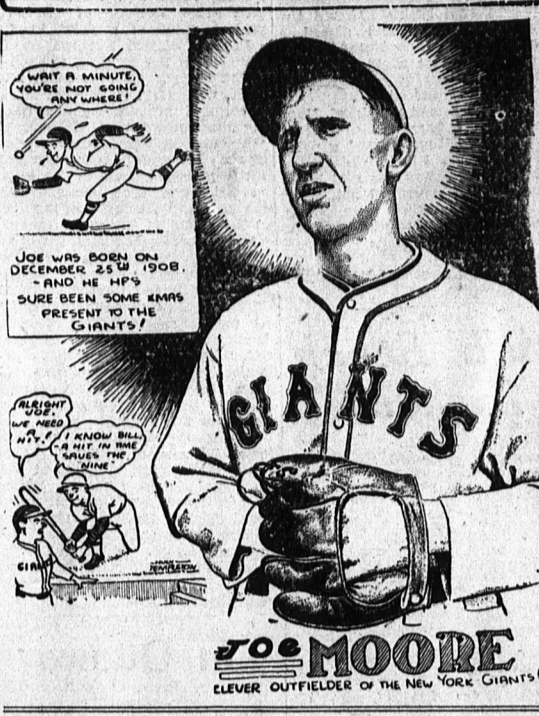

Yanks Strictly Regarded As An 'If' Club

(This is the fourth of a series dealing with prospects of Major League clubs)
(ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 11—While the experts are busy themselves picking New York Yankees to finish no better than third or fourth this season, Manager Joe McCarthy rises to object.

Most observers regard the Yanks as strictly an "if" club. "If Gehrig does this" and "if Gomez does that" and "if Di Maggio does something else," etc., etc.

During the winter the Yanks obtained Roy Johnson, a better than 300 hitter, from Boston Red Sox. With the addition of Johnson and Joe Di Maggio, the high priced recruit from the west coast, McCarthy thinks the Yanks now have one of the strongest outfields in either major.

The Yanks will have their 1935 infield intact—Gehrig on first, Tony Lazzeri on second, Red Rolfe on third and Frank Crosetti at short. Crosetti's broken leg is completely mended.

Gomez, Charlie Ruffing, at present a holdout, and Johnny Broaca, are figured starting pitchers, with a fourth to be chosen from "Bump" Hadley, obtained during the winter from Washington; Johnny Murphy, who starred in relief roles last year, and Monte Pearson from Cleveland.

Steve Sundra, a big right-hander from Newark is looking good and may be kept around to help Pat Malone, Walter Brown and Vito Tamulis with relief duties.

Plan Greatest World Games In History

(NOTE: This is the first of a series of stories on the Olympic situation in Germany, based upon first hand study by a writer who covered the winter games and has spent considerable time in Berlin, scene of the forthcoming summer sports.)

By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, March 11—Regardless of the effect of past or present developments on Germany's relations with other countries, the Nazi regime of Adolf Hitler has planned, honestly and meticulously, to present to the world next August the greatest set of Olympic Games in history.

The Germans have spared neither ingenuity, expense nor imagination in building an athletic plant eclipsing anything heretofore constructed in any sports capital. The entry list for the summer sports is a record-breaker. Short of a world war, the world's best athletes will perform here in a domestic atmosphere calculated to spread nothing but sweetness and light.

Despite a tendency in some quarters to "rock the boat," official Germany has banned racial or religious discrimination in athletics, at least for the time being. The famous girl fencer of Jewish extraction, Helene Mayer, has been welcomed back home and named to represent Germany in the Olympics. Visiting Jews, whether athletes or spectators, will be safe from indignities here.

Olympic leaders, headed by Dr. Theodor Lewald, aged president of the German Olympic committee, have sought to eliminate any trace of anti-semitism in Berlin. They accomplished generally the removal of anti-semitic signs and the removal of anti-semitic posters from the walls and windows of little stores bearing the fanciful portrait of a Jew, with the legend: "He who buys from a Jew is the enemy of his country." Only a few may be noted now, on the side streets.

The extent to which the Olympics have been or will be used as a vehicle for alleged Nazi-propaganda is another problem for international authorities. The games, throughout, have been calculated to impress the rest of the world with the greatness of Hitler's Germany.

A somewhat similar situation would have existed in 1932 if the Republican campaign committee in the United States had taken over the Los Angeles Olympics, dedicated to the then President Hoover, declared him the guiding spirit and attributed their success to his genius for organization.
