## COLLEGE ADOPTS MARRIAGE COURSE

NEW LONDON, Conn., Mar. 28—(C. P.)—Believing that a college which does not prepare its students for marriage does not prepare them adequately for life, Connecticut college will add to its curriculum next year a course in Problems of Marriage and Family Life, President Katharine Blunt has announced.

The course will be given by Dr. Dorothea H. Scoville, the college physician, who is the mother of two children, and Dr. Margaret Chaney, chairman of the Home Economics department.

The topics discussed in the course will include premarital problems as well as adjustments in married life, the physiology of reproduction and nutritional and psychological aspects of pregnancy and lactation, the development of the infant throughout childhood, and child care as related to feeding, bathing, sleep and exercise. The course will be open to juniors and seniors without prerequisite courses.

## Policy Holders Not Endangered Is Report

MONTREAL, March 28—(C.P.)—“We wish to assure our agents and policyholders in Canada that their position will not be endangered for the reason there are ample securities in Canada to meet all obligations,” stated the Globe and Rutgers Fire Insurance company of New York in a statement issued at Canadian head office here today.

(Last Friday at New York George S. Van Schaick, New York Superintendent of Insurance, signed a petition for a Supreme Court order directing him to take possession of the Globe and Rutgers Fire Insurance Company for the purpose of rehabilitation.) Today's statement showed the company had bonds on deposit with the receiver-general at Ottawa for the protection of Canadian policyholders to the market value of \$1,074,670 in addition to cash in Canadian banks of \$275,428. Other assets brought total assets in Canada to \$1,542,121 against total liabilities of \$861,004.

## IN MEMORIAM

DR. JAMES O. CALKIN

In the passing of Dr. James O. Calkin of Sackville, N. B., this community has lost another of the old school physicians who have meant so much to humanity during the past half century before and during the advent of the automobile.

Twenty years ago the late Dr. Calkin's practice was one of the largest in Eastern New Brunswick. In addition he devoted considerable time to the Residence and Ladies College of Mount Allison.

It is said of the late Dr. Calkin that he never refused a call and many needy students and patients who could not afford a physician received the same courteous care as the more fortunate ones. His love of horses, which was his only hobby, was formed in the days when it was necessary to keep three and four horses constantly in use in order to take care of his practice. This hobby culminated in 1928 in the outstanding performance on the Maritime and Maine tracks, of his favorite horse Johnny Miles, 2:11 1-4.

His skill as a diagnostician was generally recognized by the medical professions, not only in his native province but in the hospital centres of Montreal and Boston. He will be greatly missed both by his patients, friends and horse lovers.

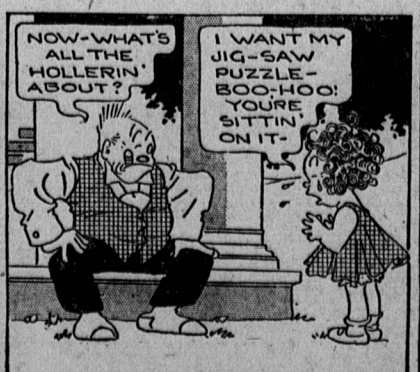
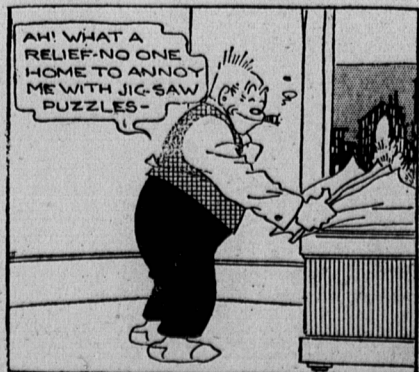
Then he heard of this country doctor, working for practically nothing and reputed to be aiding hundreds of people daily by simply
