BRITISH WOUNDED BEATEN TO DEATH.

LONDON, April 25.—That German soldiers in a rage beat British wounded to death in the charge made in a narrative of the official Eyewitness with the British troops, dated April 16, and given out by the Press Bureau today.

"In view of false accusations in enemy newspapers regarding the conduct of the British at Neuve Chapelle," the narrative says, "the following extract from the diary of a German officer, dated December 19, 1914, is interesting."

SIGHT UNNERVES SOLDIER.

"The sight of the trenches and the fury, not to say the bestiality, of our men in beating to death wounded British, affected me so much that for the rest of the day I was fit for nothing."

"The writer of this," the British official observer continues, "was in the 13th Regiment, 13th Division of the 7th German Corps. His testimony is borne out by the evidence of our men on numerous occasions, notably at Neuve Chapelle, where several of our wounded were temporarily left behind and subsequently were found bayoneted or with their brains blown out."

BABY-KILLERS ACTIVE.

Reviewing recent operations the Eyewitness says:

"On the 8th our artillery caused further losses among hostile parties in the neighborhood of Richebourg-Festubert. The enemy's trench mortars were active, but were soon silenced into silence. Our anti-aircraft guns damaged one of the enemy's aeroplanes."

"About midnight of the 12th an airship passed over the town and dropped fifteen bombs. Three women and a child were killed and a few horses were injured."

"On the 13th enemy aeroplanes were more active east of Ypres throwing flares and smoke balls over the trenches, which were then subjected to a heavy bombardment of guns and rifle grenades. On the 14th the German heavy artillery shelled Quinchy and about midnight the enemy exploded a mine close to our trenches near St. Eloi, causing a few casualties. Early the following morning we fired a mine opposite Quinchy, blowing up a portion of the hostile trenches."

"GOTT STRAFE ENGLAND."

"Prisoners state that the shortage in regular officers and the promotion of one-year volunteers has led to great deterioration in the quality of junior officers, many of whom the soldiers regard with secret contempt. The wholesale distribution of Iron Crosses has caused the decoration to be despised. The Kaiser and Von Hindenburg are still popular heroes, but the Crown Prince has lost caste."

"The absurd forms in which hatred of the British nation is exhibited are shown by the report of a prisoner that the gas tanks at Diederhoffen have been painted with 'Gott Strafe England' in enormous letters."

HAD HIS LEGS BROKEN AND RESET STRAIGHTER.

SASKATOON, Sask., April 25.—James Todd of Saskatoon, who was accepted for active service with the first contingent and subsequently rejected at Valcartier on account of his bandy legs, will again offer his services shortly. In the meantime Todd entered a city hospital and had his legs broken just below the knee and the ankle and then set in a manner to meet the military requirements.

EITEL ENABLED TO INCREASE HER SPEED

LONDON, April 26.—That the British government had protested against some of the facilities afforded the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich at Newport News was disclosed today in a reply in the House of Commons made by Sir Edward Grey to the British Foreign Minister, to a question asked by Commander Sariyot Bellairs, who recently was returned to parliament at a bye-election. Commander Bellairs asked whether the permission to repair the cruiser "included the use of the port for cleaning her hull, thereby increasing her

speed chances of escape from the British cruisers."

Sir Edward Grey said that before her internment the Eitel Friedrich had had her bottom cleaned and coated with a non-fouling composition while in dry dock in Newport News, thus considerably increasing her speed. "His Majesty's government," Sir Edward continued, "protested, on the or radius of action, as the case might be, was an increase of her fighting force, such as Article 17 of The Hague convention forbids. The United States government refused to admit this, considering that any damage sustained by the action of the sea, and not inflicted by an enemy, may be made good. They also called attention to the provision that the local authorities of neutral powers shall decide what repairs are necessary."
