Guards on Bridges To Cut Off Ottawa

MONTREAL, Jan. 24.—Dr. Savard, inspector general of the Superior Board of Health for the Province of Quebec, returned to Montreal today from Ottawa, where he interviewed the health authorities of that city in connection with the present outbreak of smallpox. Dr. Savard stated that a quarantine barrier had been established between Ottawa and Hull, no one being allowed to enter the latter city from the former without a certificate of vaccination. Dr. Savard said that it was on his advice that the health authorities of Ottawa decided to adopt a compulsory vaccination law to go into effect immediately.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—A public and solemn engagement among the great powers not to violate or permit violation of the territorial integrity of Russia is regarded by President Wilson as sine qua non of an attempt at pacification of Armenia and other states bordering on the once great empire. The President's views as set forth in the note transmitted to Paul Hymans, President of the League of Nations Assembly by Acting Secretary Davis, under date of January 18 refers to the "distressful situation" in Armenia which has been invaded by both is one detail of vast Russian problem. The President says he most earnestly urges his conviction that it only by a general comprehensive treatment of the whole problem" only by the full and generous cooperation of the principal power that a hopeful approach to pacification of independence for Armenia is to be found. The President says he never believed problems raised by Bolshevik coup d'etat could be solved by military action from outside. He expresses the hope that the recent tragic events on the Polish front and in the Crimea have convinced all the world that armed invasion is not the way to bring peace to the people of Russia.
