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Teachers Convention On Making a Will

The Convention for teachers in Mr. Gallant's Inspectorate was held in O'Leary September 23rd. The morning session was called to order by Inspector Gallant. Owing to the absence of the president, Mr. Elmer Pineau was elected to act as president for the day. Following the election of the president the registration of teachers took place.

A brief but interesting address on arithmetic was given by the president Mr. Pineau who among other facts stated that object lessons are necessary if arithmetic is to be taught successfully. He emphasized the fact that accuracy of work should be required in the lower grades. In closing he invited all teachers to take part in Convention discussions.

Following the president's address a very instructive address was given by Inspector Gallant who laid special stress on the teacher's duty to the child beginning school. He advised that as much individual help as possible be given as the different character of the children have their own peculiar needs and require different treatments. He also advised that joint meetings of teachers and ratepayers be held for the purpose of discussing school matters in a general way. In conclusion he asked the teachers to enlist the cooperation of the parents in the school's work.

A brief discussion of the Inspector's remarks followed in the afternoon. The question box came next of the program. Several questions which caused a lively and interesting discussion were presented.

The meeting was then adjourned until afternoon.

The Chief Superintendent of Education attended the Convention and after a brief discussion on the different methods of conducting the P. S. C. examinations he imparted some valuable information to the teachers concerning their work. He strongly advised supplementary reading in the school, the encouragement of the pupils and discussions among the pupils relative to their lessons also through map study.

A paper on Geography, written by Miss Pearl Lockery was read by Miss Mabel Pindling. In this paper it was stated that the three important points to be considered in the teaching of geography are notes, reviews and sketch maps. The use of good notes and constant reviews are necessary if the work is to be remembered while sketch maps help the pupils to learn the accurate locations of places.

The following resolutions were adopted:

1. Resolved—That the thanks of this convention be tendered the people of O'Leary for the use of the school building.

Also Resolved—That the thanks of this convention be tendered the Superintendent for his instructive address and also to Inspector Gallant for his valuable information.

The Convention then closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

Quebec Treasurer SLATED FOR BENCH

QUEBEC, Sept. 24.—Hon. Jacob Nicol, Provincial Treasurer in the Taschereau Government, will be appointed a Judge of the Superior Court in a few weeks, according to definite information here.

It is understood that Hon. Herbert Marler, former Liberal M. P., Montreal, will become Treasurer. The appointment of the latter will be made in October.

It is also strongly rumored that Chief Justice Sir Francis Levesque of the Superior Court will shortly resign his post and be replaced by Hon. J. E. Perrault, Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries.

Chief Justice Levesque will retain his functions as Aoyal Commissioner in connection with the Customs Branch.
