## MINUTES OF THE PRESBYTERY

### Meeting Held at the Presbyterian Church, Bedouque, October 25th 1906

At Bedouque, and within the Presbyterian church there, on Thursday, October 25th, 1906, and at 2 o'clock p.m., the 100th anniversary of the birth of Prince Edward Island was celebrated by the moderator, Mr. John McIntosh, with whom were present Messrs. E. J. Butler, A. D. Sterling, A. S. Stewart, M. H. McIntosh, ministers, and James Carruthers, elder. Mr. James Carruthers was appointed clerk pro tempore. The object for the induction of Mr. M. H. McIntosh having been returned as duly served, proclamation was read before the assembled congregation, and no objection being made to the life or fortunes of Mr. McIntosh, Mr. A. S. Stewart conducted divine service, preaching from St. Mark 16:13. The moderator narrated the steps and put the usual questions, which being satisfactorily answered, Mr. M. H. McIntosh was by prayer inducted into the pastoral charge of Bedouque, and received the right hand of fellowship from the members of the Presbytery. Mr. A. D. Sterling addressed the newly inducted minister and Mr. John McIntosh the people, each respectively.

### SHE RESTS BESIDE QUEEN GUINEVERE

GLASGOW, Oct. 27.—The burial of Lady Campbell-Bannerman in Meigs churchyard might well have drawn more attention than it has done to a curious and interesting tradition of the spot. The tradition, shortly stated, is that the dust of Guinevere, spouse of the famous King Arthur, lies in the churchyard. By the villagers, who repeat the tradition, she is called "Queen Wanderer" or "Yanona," but there is no doubt as to the person intended. A large low mound among the graves beside the church is pointed out as the actual spot where she lies, and certain of the strange carved stones which once stood in the churchyard and are now preserved in the old village school are said to commemorate her end.

## MARLBOROUGHS HAVE SEPARATED

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The afternoon papers quoted the Manchester Guardian as saying that a deed of separation between Duke and Duchess of Marlborough had been signed on the grounds of incompatibility of temper, by the provisions of which the Duchess keeps Sunderland House, London, and her own dowry, but is precluded from going to Bletchley. The document, it was added, was signed October 20. The Duke is now at Bletchley and the Duchess is staying at Sunderland House.

## CHANGES MADE IN SYDNEY MINES

SYDNEY MINES, Oct. 29.—Rumor has it that in the course of a few weeks great changes and improvements will take place at the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company's plant. So favorable have been the results, and so well has the product of the company been received on the market that the supply can by no means meet the demand. It is said that at present orders are being received by the big company which necessitate their increasing their plant at the blast furnace and other departments of their works. Next week, if possible, the furnace will be closed down to give it a thorough overhaul, and it is likely within a short time the blast furnace at Ferronville will be re-erected along side the present one. In addition to this the company will increase their open hearths by three or four which will mean employment for more men.
